Funding Opportunity Announcement Summary

The NRCS Texas State Office, an agency under the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), is seeking support from and opportunities to partner with likeminded natural resource conservation partners. The overall intent of this notice is to solicit partnerships to help enhance the implementation of key conservation objectives and priorities outlined further in this document.

Texas NRCS is a federal agency that works hand-in-hand with the people of Texas for the purpose of helping bring about the conservation and sustainable use of land, water, wildlife, and related resources.

The Texas NRCS Rural Conservation Project is an effort to challenge States, political subdivisions, or agency thereof, a public or private agency, organizations, educational institutions and federally recognized Native American tribal governments to establish vegetable and fruit gardens, rainwater harvesting systems, pollinator habitat and high tunnels across Texas. The simple act of planting a garden can help unite neighbors in a common effort and inspire locally-led solutions to challenges facing our state. Challenges that can be addressed with locally-led solutions can be diverse in rural settings. Addressing hunger with a garden can bring communities together and initiate other positive outcomes for people. Pollinator habitat planned with gardens can provide an increase in harvest potential while providing food and habitat for declining insect communities in Texas.

The Texas NRCS Rural Conservation Project will provide technical and financial assistance to eligible entities to establish or improve gardens for food production, rainwater harvesting systems, for attracting and maintaining pollinators like monarch butterflies and the establishment of high tunnels to extend the growing season of fruits and vegetables.

Conservation entities are invited to apply for NRCS assistance with the following key conservation objectives:

1. Provide learning experiences in natural resources conservation to rural communities.
2. Address food deserts.
3. Create gardening projects that develop properties into vegetable and fruit production sites.
4. Improve access to healthy, affordable food at a local level.
5. Water conservation.
6. Increase water availability for gardens through rainwater harvesting systems.
7. Increase pollinator habitat.
8. Leverage non-federal resources to achieve positive natural resources conservation outcomes.

Proposals will be accepted from eligible entities for projects located in Texas. NRCS anticipates that the total amount awarded under this announcement in Federal fiscal year 2019 will be approximately \$275,000. This opportunity is open to States, political subdivisions, or agency thereof, a public or private agency, organizations, educational institutions and federally recognized Native American tribal governments (7 USC 6962a) for competitive consideration of grant awards for one year in duration.

The NRCS has funding available as follows:

1. Grants up to \$4,000 will be available for a vegetable garden.
2. Financial resources are to be utilized for garden supplies which can include tools, seed, plants, fertilizer, soil, soil additives, irrigation materials and other garden materials.
3. Grants up to \$5,000 will be available for rainwater harvesting systems.
4. Grants up to \$3,000 will be available for pollinator habitat.
5. Grants up to \$6,500 will be available for high tunnels.
6. Some technical assistance by NRCS staff will be available to provide information on soil health, plant species for pollinator habitat and design criteria for high tunnels and rainwater harvesting systems.
7. The applicant must have and maintain control of the land where the vegetable garden, rainwater harvesting system, pollinator habitat and/or high tunnel will be established for the duration of the agreement.
8. The applicant is responsible for maintaining the garden, rainwater harvesting system and/or high tunnel once it is established for the duration of the agreement.
9. Applicants may request funding for a combination choice of garden, rainwater harvesting system, pollinator habitat and high tunnel.

Applications will be screened for completeness and compliance with the provisions of this notice. Incomplete and/or noncompliant applications will be eliminated from competition and notification of elimination will be sent to the applicant.

The Texas State Conservationist reserves the right not to fund any or all applications. NRCS will accept applications under this notice for a single year submitted by eligible entities.

Federal Funding Floor and Ceiling Amounts

The funding floor for this announcement is \$1,000, and the funding ceiling is \$18,500. The funding floor means the minimum agreement funding amount for the Federal share per agreement awarded. The ceiling is the maximum agreement funding amount for the Federal share per agreement awarded.

B. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The authorizing statutes and regulations for this opportunity are 7 U.S.C. 6962a and Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008, Public Law 110-246; Food Security Act of 1985, Title XII, Part Subtitle D, Section 1237, Public Law 99-198, 16 U.S.C 3831-3835a. Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act, Public Law 74-76, N/A Stat. N/A, 16 U.S.C 590 a-f. Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008, Section 2602, Public Law 110-246; Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002, Section 2502, Public Law 107-171; Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996, Section 387, Public Law 104-127, 110 Stat. 888, 16 U.S.C 3836a. Subtitle I of Title XII of the Food Security Act of 1985 as amended by section 2401 of the Agricultural Act of 2014.

C. FEDERAL AWARD INFORMATION

1. Estimated Funding

The total amount of Federal funding the agency expects to award through this announcement is \$275,000.

2. Start Dates and Performance Periods

Projects may be for one year in duration. Applicants should plan their projects based on a project start date of August 15, 2019.

3. Type of Federal Award

The agency plans to award a grant pursuant to this opportunity notice. A grant is a legal instrument of financial assistance between a Federal agency and a non-Federal entity that, consistent with 31 U.S.C. 6302, 6304: (a) is used to enter into a relationship with the principal purpose of transferring anything of value from the Federal awarding agency to the non-federal entity to carry out a public purpose authorized by a law of the United States (see 31 U.S.C. 6101(3)); and (b) is distinguished from a cooperative agreement in that it does not provide for substantial involvement between the Federal awarding agency and the non-Federal entity in carrying out the activity contemplated by the award. It may not be used to procure products or services for the primary benefit of the government.

4. Number of Awards

The agency expects to make approximately 20 awards.

D. ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

1. Eligible Applicants

Applicants and applications must meet eligibility criteria by the application deadline to be considered for award. Eligible applicant type is determined by the implementing program statute.

This opportunity is open to States, political subdivisions, or agency thereof, a public or private agency, organizations, educational institutions and federally recognized Native American tribal governments (7 USC 6962a) for competitive consideration of grant awards for one year in duration.

2. Cost Sharing or Matching

No cost share is required.

3. Other (if applicable)

The project must be located in an rural area meeting the following definition: The term "rural" and "rural area" mean any open country, or any place, town, village, or city which is not part of or associated with an urban area and which (1) has a population not in excess of 2,500 inhabitants, or (2) has a population in excess of 2,500 but not in excess of 10,000 if it is rural in character, or (3) has a population

in excess of 10,000 but not in excess of 20,000, and is not contained within a standard metropolitan statistical area (MSA).

The OMB defines a Metropolitan Statistical Area as one or more adjacent counties or county equivalents that have at least one urban core area of at least 50,000 population, plus adjacent territory that has a high degree of social and economic integration with the core as measured by commuting ties.

Applicant entities identified in the SAM.gov Exclusions database as ineligible, prohibited/restricted or excluded from receiving Federal contracts, certain subcontracts, and certain Federal assistance and benefits will not be considered for Federal funding, as applicable to the funding being requested under this Federal program.

3. Unique entity identifier and System for Award Management (SAM)

Each applicant (unless the applicant is an individual excepted from those requirements under 2 CFR §25.110(b) or (c), or has an exception approved by the Federal awarding agency under 2 CFR §25.110(d)) is required to: (i) Be registered in SAM before submitting its application; (ii) provide a valid unique entity identifier (Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number) in its application; and (iii) continue to maintain an active SAM registration with current information at all times during which it has an active Federal award or an application or plan under consideration by a Federal awarding agency. 4. Submission Dates and Times

Proposals must be received by 4:30 p.m. Central Standard Time (CST) on June 7, 2019. Late submissions will not be reviewed or considered. The agency will rely on system generated date and time receipt documentation to determine whether applications meet the submission deadline. 5. Funding Restrictions

Funds may not be used to pay any of the following costs unless otherwise permitted by law, or approved in writing by the Authorized Departmental Officer in advance of incurring such costs:

- a. Costs above the amount of funds authorized for the project;
- b. Costs incurred prior to the effective date of the grant;
- c. Costs which lie outside the scope of the approved project and amendments thereto;
- d. Entertainment costs, regardless of their apparent relationship to project objectives;
- e. Compensation for injuries to persons, or damage to property arising out of project activities;
- f. Consulting services performed by a Federal employee during official duty hours when such consulting services result in the payment of additional compensation to the employee; and
- g. Renovation or refurbishment of research or related spaces, the purchase or installation of fixed equipment in such spaces, and the planning, repair, rehabilitation, acquisition, or construction of buildings or facilities.

This list is not exhaustive. See 2 CFR 200 Subpart E, Cost Principles for additional information. Questions regarding the allowances of particular items of cost should be directed to the administrative contact person listed in this announcement.

Indirect costs limitations:

- a. A non-profit organization or institution of higher education awarded a grant will be limited to a 10% indirect cost rate in accordance with the Agency's annual appropriations act. The 10% indirect cost rate applies to both federal

and non-federal funds. Other types of entities are not subject to this statutory limitation.

- b. To be eligible to recover any indirect cost under a Federal award, recipients must either 1) have a current negotiated indirect cost rate agreement (NICRA) with a Federal agency that has not expired; or 2) qualify for use of the de minimis rate authorized by 2 CFR 200.414(f). In order to qualify for the de minimis rate, the recipient must have never had a NICRA. A State, local, or tribal governmental department or agency unit that receives more than \$35 million in direct Federal funding is not eligible for the de minimis rate.
- c. Applicants not subject to the statutory limitation stated above, which have a current NICRA must calculate indirect costs using the rate and base specified in their NICRA. A recipient may voluntarily reduce or waive recovery of indirect costs at its sole discretion and must not be encouraged or coerced in any way to do so by the agency. If voluntarily reduced or waived, the recipient may choose to apply any unrecovered indirect costs as part of their cost share or match. Unrecovered indirect cost means the difference between the amount charged to the Federal award and the amount which could have been charged to the Federal award under the recipient's approved negotiated indirect cost rate (2 CFR 200.306(c)). Indirect costs may not be recovered under an expired NICRA. However, if an applicant with a current NICRA is subject to the statutory limitation, indirect costs must be calculated as follows. First, multiply the NICRA rate by the base stated in the NICRA to arrive at Amount A. Next, multiply the statutory limit of 10% by the total of all direct costs to arrive at Amount B. The lower of Amount A and B is the amount of indirect cost to include on the budget.
- d. Entities that are eligible for the de minimis rate who already have a de minimis rate agreement must use the rate and base specified in the agreement, which is modified total direct costs (MTDC) as defined by 2 CFR 200.68 and also excluding the amount of each subcontract exceeding \$25,000. Note that MTDC excludes certain costs from the base to which the rate is applied. A copy of the applicant's de minimis rate agreement must be provided with the application. If a recipient is eligible to use the de minimis rate, but does not have a de minimis rate agreement, use an indirect cost rate of no more than 10% of MTDC when preparing the budget. If selected for award, a de minimis rate agreement will be executed along with the award. Applicants wishing to use the de minimis rate must submit a signed statement certifying that the entity 1) has never had a NICRA previously and 2) specifically request a de minimis rate agreement. (These documents need not be submitted with applicant's initial proposal. See section D2 above.)
- e. For Profit Entities are not eligible to apply. Profit is not an eligible project cost.

- f. Individuals are not eligible to apply.

F. APPLICATION REVIEW INFORMATION

1. Merit/Technical Criteria

- a. The extent to which the proposal supports conservation objectives of soil health, organics, pest management, and water conservation.
- b. The extent which the proposal places emphasis to enhance community access to technical assistance to address food deserts.
- c. The extent which the proposal places emphasis on creating rural gardening projects that develop rural properties into vegetable production sites or pollinator habitat.
- d. The extent which the proposal places emphasis on leveraging non-federal and non-government resources to achieve positive natural resources conservation outcomes.
- e. Evidence in the proposal that the design and implementation of project is based on sound methodology and demonstrated technology.
- f. Measurability of project outcomes.
- g. Potential for successful completion.
- h. Project benefits young, beginning, small, minority, veteran and other underserved producers, historically underserved people or communities, or community-based organizations comprised of or representing these groups.
- i. Milestones and timelines are clear and reasonable.
- j. Project staff has the technical expertise needed.
- k. Budget is adequately explained and justified.
- l. Experience and capacity to partner with and gain the support of other organizations, institutions, and agencies.

2. Review and Selection Process

Merit/technical reviews will be conducted by a technical review team which will submit recommendations to the approving official based on the criteria listed in Section F1 above. The approving official will make the final award decisions. The approving official for this opportunity is the State Conservationist.

The project must be located in an rural area meeting the following definition: The term "rural" and "rural area" mean any open country, or any place, town, village, or city which is not part of or associated with an urban area and which (1) has a population not in excess of 2,500 inhabitants, or (2) has a population in excess of 2,500 but not in excess of 10,000 if it is rural in character, or (3) has a population in excess of 10,000 but not in excess of 20,000, and is not contained within a standard metropolitan statistical area (MSA).

The OMB defines a Metropolitan Statistical Area as one or more adjacent counties or county equivalents that have at least one urban core area of at least 50,000 population, plus adjacent territory that has a high degree of social and economic integration with the core as measured by commuting ties.

In addition, the agency will check SAM to ensure the applicant is not suspended or debarred, which would preclude receiving an award. In addition, prior to making a Federal award with a total Federal share greater than the simplified acquisition threshold (\$250,000), the agency must review and consider any information about the applicant that is in the designated integrity and performance system accessible through SAM (the Federal Awardee Performance Integrity Information System, FAPIIS) (see 41 U.S.C. 2313 and 2 CFR 200.205(a)). An applicant may review information in FAPIIS accessible through SAM and comment on any information about it that a Federal awarding agency previously entered. The agency will consider any comments by the applicant, in addition to the other information in the designated integrity and performance system, in making a judgment about the applicant's integrity, business ethics, and record of performance under Federal awards when completing the review.

3. Anticipated Announcement and Federal Award Dates

The agency anticipates announcing or notifying successful and unsuccessful applicants by July 8, 2019 and expects to have Federal awards in place by August 15, 2019.

G. FEDERAL AWARD ADMINISTRATION INFORMATION

1. Federal Award Notices

The agency will provide notice that an application has been selected before it actually makes the Federal award. As such, the selection notification is not an authorization to begin performance. Any pre-award costs incurred by the awardee will not be reimbursed. The Notice of Grant and Agreement Award (form NRCS-ADS-093) signed by the authorized agency representative is the only authorizing document and will be provided electronically to the entity's authorized representative for signature.

Both successful and unsuccessful applicants will be notified of the award decision via letter.

2. Administrative and National Policy Requirements

All project funds will be used in accordance with 2 CFR 200 and NRCS's General Terms and Conditions; a copy of the General Terms and Conditions may be obtained by contacting the Federal Awarding Agency Contacts listed in this announcement.

3. Reporting

Reporting will follow NRCS' General Terms and Conditions but will generally include electronic submission of semiannual progress reports, quarterly financial status reports, and final reports.

If the Federal share of any agreement awarded under this opportunity notice may include more than \$500,000 over the period of performance, recipients must also comply with the post award reporting requirements reflected in Appendix XII of 2 CFR Part 200 —Award Term and Condition for Recipient Integrity and Performance Matters.
