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Executive Summary

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) requests interested entities to submit research, restoration, and Regional Project proposals for the restoration of the Great Lakes Basin fish and wildlife resources, as authorized under the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act (16U.S.C. 941c). The purpose of the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act (GLFWRA) is to provide assistance to States, Indian Tribes, and other interested entities to encourage cooperative conservation, restoration, research, and management of the fish and wildlife resources and their habitats in the Great Lakes Basin. Supported in part by the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, we expect approximately \$3.5 million to support proposals this fiscal year. Available funding and proposal awards are subject to final Congressional appropriations for Fiscal Year 2026. Up to 33 and one-third percent of the total Congressional appropriation to the GLFWRA is eligible to fund Regional Project proposals.

Expected award funding for Regional Project proposals is between \$200,000 to \$500,000. Successful restoration and research proposals have ranged from \$2,000 to \$500,000 with the average proposal at \$217,843. Expected award funding for restoration and research proposals is between \$10,000 and \$250,000. Selected restoration and research proposals and Regional Project proposals will be awarded funding for the duration of the proposal via a grant or cooperative agreement between the recipient and the Service. Funding will be made available once the official award letter has been received by the successful applicant and the performance period has started. Continuation of proposals funded in previous fiscal years are eligible but will be considered and reviewed as a new proposal. Restoration and research proposals will be awarded

a grant agreement and Regional Project proposals will be awarded a cooperative agreement under this announcement. Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Units (CESU) Network partners that submit Regional Project proposals that qualify as CESU proposals will be subject to the CESU indirect cost rate cap. Regional Projects are authorized activities of the Service related to fish and wildlife resource protection, restoration, maintenance, and enhancement impacting the resources of multiple States or Indian Tribes with fish and wildlife management authority in the Great Lakes Basin.

The two-page restoration and research pre-proposals and Regional Project proposals are submitted to the Service to determine eligibility and the Proposal Review Committee (PRC) scores and ranks the proposals using GLFWRA Review Criteria (Review Criteria). Successful restoration and research pre-proposal applicants are invited to submit full proposals, which are scored and ranked by the PRC using the Review Criteria. The PRC recommends the restoration and research full proposals and Regional Project proposals for funding to the Service's Midwest Region 3 Regional Director for approval. Successful restoration and research and Regional Project proposal applicants can anticipate receiving an official grant or cooperative agreement award letter between January and March 2027.

Restoration and Research Proposals: All proposals **require a 25% non-federal match**. Not less than **25% of the total cost of implementing a proposal** shall be paid in cash or in-kind contributions by non-Federal sources. Applicants may attribute some or all of their allowable unrecovered indirect costs as cost-share/match, however recipients may only charge to the Federal award the indirect costs calculated against the allowable direct costs charged to the Federal award. Recipients may not charge to the Federal award indirect costs calculated against: 1) any portion of the recipient's direct costs; or 2) any portion of the direct costs charged to any other Federal or non-Federal partner.

The required non-federal match is **25% of the total proposal costs** (funding request + non-federal match). For example, if the request for federal funding is \$75,000, the minimum required non-federal match is \$25,000, and the total proposal costs would be \$100,000. ($\$75,000 / 0.75 = \$100,000 - \$75,000.00 = \$25,000$).

Restoration and research pre-proposals **without a 25% non-federal match will not be considered**.

Required non-federal match or cost sharing above the 25% of the total cost of implementing the proposal is not a criterion (see Review Criteria) to evaluate your proposal. You will not receive extra points by exceeding the 25% required non-federal match.

Non-Federal Match Details

Time Period for Providing Non-Federal Match: The non-federal share of the cost of implementing a proposal may be provided at any time during the 2 year period preceding January 1 of the year in which the Service receives the restoration and/or research pre-proposal or Regional Project proposal.

Sources of Non-Federal Match: To be accepted as match it must be in compliance with [§200.306](#) Cost sharing or matching.

- The appraised value of land or a conservation easement connected with the proposal.
- The costs associated with securing a conservation easement; and restoration or enhancement of the conservation easement.
- Appraisal of conservation easement. The value of a conservation easement may be used to meet the non-federal share of the cost of implementing a proposal, as long as it meets the following:

- Within the 2-year time period for allowable match;
- Is acquired before the end of the proposal grant period;
- Is held in perpetuity for conservation purposes of Service programs, related to the Great Lakes Basin, and a) by an accredited land trust or conservancy or a Federal, State, or tribal agency; b) is connected either physically or through a conservation planning process to the proposal; and c) the appraisal valuation date shall not be later than 1 year after the price of the conservation easement was set under a contract.
- The appraisal shall conform to the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice (USPAP) and completed by a Federal or State certified appraiser.
- All costs associated with securing a conservation easement and restoration or enhancement of that conservation easement may be used to meet the non-federal match of implementing a proposal. The costs may include cash, in-kind contributions, and indirect costs. The costs may not be associated with mitigation or litigation (other than costs associated with the Natural Resource Damage Assessment program).

Regional Projects: Regional Project proposals selected for funding shall be exempt from cost sharing or partner match if the Service’s Midwest Region 3 Regional Director determines the authorization for the proposal does not require a non-federal cost-share. Required System Registrations

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Program Goals

- All submitted proposals must address one or more of the following goals:
 1. Proposal will restore and maintain self-sustaining fish and wildlife resources.
 2. Proposal will minimize the impacts of contaminants on fishery and wildlife resources.
 3. Proposal will protect, maintain and, where degraded and destroyed, restore fish and wildlife habitat, including the enhancement and creation of wetlands that result in a net gain in the amount of those habitats.
 4. Proposal will stop illegal activities adversely impacting fishery and wildlife resources.
 5. Proposal will restore threatened and endangered species to viable, self-sustaining levels.
 6. Proposal will protect, manage, and conserve migratory birds.

Program Description

The purpose of the GLFWRA is to provide assistance to States, Indian Tribes, and other interested entities to encourage cooperative conservation, restoration, research, and management of the fish and wildlife resources and their habitats in the Great Lakes Basin. All proposals should focus on the restoration and or research of fish and/or wildlife resources in the Great Lakes Basin and should be consistent with the [goals of the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act of 2022](#) and the recommendations of the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration's "[Strategy to Restore and Protect the Great Lakes.](#)" When appropriate, all proposals should be consistent with:

- The [Great Lakes Restoration Initiative Action Plan IV](#);
- The goals of the [Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement](#);
- The [Non-indigenous Aquatic Nuisance Prevention and Control Act](#) as reauthorized by the National Invasive Species Act;
- The [fish community objectives](#) identified by the [lake committees](#) and the Council of Lake Committees;
- The [Convention on Great Lakes Fisheries](#);
- The [Joint Strategic Plan for Management of Great Lakes Fisheries](#);
- The [North American Waterfowl Management Plan](#);
- Addresses [research and/or monitoring priorities](#) of the [Upper Mississippi River and Great Lakes Region Joint Venture 2007 Implementation Plan](#);

- [Applicable State Wildlife Action Plans](#); and
- Additional step down plans that further specify the implementation of the goals and objectives of the above plans at the state, tribal, watershed or local level.

Supported in part by the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, we expect approximately \$3,500,000 to support proposals this fiscal year. Funding will be made available once the official award letter has been received and the performance period has started. Continuation of proposals funded in previous fiscal years are eligible but will be considered and reviewed as a new proposal.

Sponsorship: During the development of the restoration or research pre-proposal make sure you discuss your proposal with the natural resource agency (e.g., local staff) in the Great Lakes Basin that has management authority (State and/or Tribal natural resource agencies) where your proposal will take place on the ground or will potentially benefit. This is the first step in obtaining sponsorship for your full proposal. Proof of sponsorship is not required at the pre-proposal stage. If you get invited to submit a restoration and research full proposal, the GLFWRA Coordinator will provide contact information for a PRC member, so you can discuss your full proposal, and obtain required sponsorship to be eligible to receive funding.

Regional Projects: Regional Project proposals must be submitted by a State Director and/or Tribal Chair (or a joint submission from the supervisors of the agency's fish and wildlife programs on behalf of the Director or Tribal Chair). Regional Project proposals should impact multiple Great Lakes, States and/or Tribes and consequently must include the signature or other written documentation of all State Directors and Tribal Chairs who support the proposal (or joint signatures or letter of support from the supervisors of the agency's fish and wildlife programs on behalf of the State Director or Tribal Chair). Regional Project proposals selected for funding shall be exempt from cost sharing or partner match if the Service's Midwest Region 3 Regional Director determines the authorization for the proposal does not require a non-federal cost-share. Please contact the GLFWRA Coordinator if you have questions.

Letters of support are encouraged.

There is no limit on the number of restoration or research pre-proposals or Regional Project proposals an applicant may submit.

Restoration and research proposals will be awarded as a **grant agreement** and Regional Project proposals will be awarded as a **cooperative agreement** under this announcement.

The Proposal Review Committee has established the following guidelines and restrictions for funding provided through the Act.

- Not less than 25% of the total cost of implementing a proposal shall be paid in cash or in-kind contributions by non-Federal sources.
- Construction and engineering costs are allowed for restoration proposals that directly benefit fish and wildlife resources in the Great Lakes Basin.
- Equipment purchases are allowable for those items necessary to meet the stated proposal objectives and shall follow the requirements within 2 CFR 200, including but not limited to 2 CFR 200.12, 2 CFR 200.313, and 200.407.
- Regional Project proposals selected for funding, will be issued a cooperative agreement as the funding instrument. Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Units (CESU) Network partners that submit Regional Project proposals that qualify as CESU proposals will be subject to the CESU indirect cost rate cap (currently 17.5%).
- Funding is not available for salaries of permanent or tenured staff; however, tenured staff on less than 12-month appointments are eligible for funding (e.g., 9-month tenured staff would be eligible for up to 3 months funding). Staff on soft money or with annual contracts are eligible for funding.
- The development of management plans is not eligible for funding; however, gathering important information for the development of management plans and implementing actions listed in management plans are eligible for funding.
- Travel funds to attend and present results at conferences is limited to \$1,000 per person, up to a maximum of \$2,000 per award.
- All funded proposals are required to document compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Pursuant to this, successful applicants must complete a series of environmental checks and/or documents to ensure compliance. Depending on the scope and scale of the proposal this may be as simple as a NEPA checklist or as complex as the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement. Service funds cannot be used to complete on the ground activities until NEPA compliance has been documented.
- **Grant funds may be used** for proposal activities after **January 1, 2027**, however, **costs must be authorized and approved by the Service per 2 CFR 200 and costs will NOT be reimbursed if the proposal is not approved for funding.** Activities before **January 1, 2027**, are ineligible as a grant activity and will not be reimbursed with grant funds.
- If your proposal is selected for funding, pre-federal award costs will be allowed, if deemed necessary by the GLFWRA Coordinator.

Recipients are encouraged to prioritize projects in support of the celebration of America's 250th birthday (America250). This may include, but is not limited to, projects that recognize and honor the nation's founding, history, and cultural heritage.

Buy America Preferences for Infrastructure Projects

Type of Award

Projects will be funded through CA (Cooperative Agreement), G (Grant).

Recipient should expect the Federal agency to have substantial involvement in the project.

Regional Project proposals will be issued as a cooperative agreement that requires substantial involvement by Service employee(s). Substantial involvement includes performing one or more of the following activities:

- Participating and working closely with the recipient in carrying out the scope of work, including training recipient personnel or detailing Federal personnel to work on the proposal effort.
- Reviewing and approving one stage of work before the next stage can begin.
- Prior to award, reviewing and approving proposed modifications or sub-awards.
- Helping select proposal staff or trainees.
- Directing or redirecting the work because of interrelationships with other proposals.
- Reserving the right to immediately halt an activity if detailed performance specifications are not met.
- Limiting recipient discretion with respect to scope of work, organizational structure, staffing, mode of operations and other management processes, coupled with close monitoring or operational involvement during performance under the award.
- Research and restoration proposals will be awarded a grant agreement. Grant agreements can't use the Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Units (CESU) or the Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit program agreements for the indirect cost rate.
- Regional Project full proposals selected for funding, will be issued a cooperative agreement as the funding instrument. CESU Network partners that submit Regional Project proposals that qualify as CESU proposals will be subject to the CESU indirect cost rate cap.

Budget Narrative

Applicants must describe and justify items and costs listed in their budget. The budget narrative must identify the following cost items: total estimated costs, non-Federal cost share, third-party contributions, and any pre-award costs. Total project cost is the sum of all allowable costs, including required and voluntary cost share and third-party contributions.

Eligibility Review

During the eligibility review, the application is checked for timely submission, completed packages (see [Application Documents](#) above) and alignment with the requirements of this announcement. The Federal agency may remove an application if it does not pass the eligibility review.

The GLFWRA Coordinator is responsible for determining if the proposal is eligible using the following screening process:

1. Are the proposed activities or work (e.g., habitat restoration and barrier removal) within the Great Lakes Basin or impact a fish or wildlife species (e.g., research, assessment) present in the Great Lakes Basin?

2. Has the 25% non-federal match requirement been met?

3. Is the proposal in Microsoft Word or pdf format, did they adhere to the instructions (number of pages, one-page limit for resumes and curriculum vitae, do they follow the number of word limitations for several sections?

- If an applicant's proposal is not eligible because of # 1 above, the GLFWRA Coordinator contacts the applicant via email or by phone to make sure the proposal is outside the Great Lakes Basin.
- When an applicant's proposal is not eligible because of # 2 or #3 above, the GLFWRA Coordinator contacts the applicant via email or by phone call to discuss the issue and allows time for the applicant to make revisions, so it can be accepted.
- If an application is incomplete, the GLFWRA Coordinator contacts the applicant and gives them the opportunity to submit the missing or required documents.

Proposal Review Committee: The Proposal Review Committee (PRC) is comprised of two representatives of each of the State Directors (New York, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania) and Indian Tribes (Chippewa Ottawa Resource Authority, Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission, Keweenaw Bay Indian Community, Seneca Nation, and Oneida Nation) in the Great Lakes Basin. The two representatives (one fishery expert and one wildlife expert) are appointed by the State Director or Indian Tribe to serve on the PRC. The PRC is responsible for scoring and ranking research, restoration, and Regional Project proposals and provides recommendations to the Midwest Region 3 Regional Director on which proposals should be funded and implemented. The PRC operates under the guidance of the Service.

Pre-Proposals and Full Proposals Restoration and Research: Restoration and research pre-proposals are scored and ranked by the PRC using the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act Review Criteria (Review Criteria). Successful applicants are invited to submit full proposals based on the merit of the pre-proposal. Full proposals have a minimum of two peer reviewers and each peer reviewer completes an evaluation form and signs a conflict of interest form. Peer

reviewers are selected by the GLFWRA Coordinator based on their technical expertise. Applicants are not required to provide a list of peer reviewers for their proposal. The PRC receives a peer reviewer summary for each proposal for use during their scoring and ranking process. The PRC recommends full proposals to be funded to the Midwest Region 3 Regional Director for approval.

Regional Projects: The PRC scores and ranks the Regional Project proposals using the Review Criteria. Each proposal is scored and ranked by the PRC. Applicants will be invited to give a presentation on their proposal to the PRC between September 21 - 25, 2026. The PRC makes recommendations to the Midwest Region 3 Regional Director on how much of the annual appropriations should be allocated to Regional Project proposals and which proposals should be developed into final Service work plans for funding.

All Proposals: Prior to participating in any review or evaluation process, all staff and peer reviewers, evaluators, panel members, and advisors must sign and return to the program office point of contact the “Department of the Interior Conflict of Interest Certification” form. For a copy of this form, contact the Service point of contact identified in the Agency Contacts section below.

The PRC may negotiate selected proposals scopes of work and budgets prior to making a recommendation for funding to the Midwest Region 3 Regional Director for approval. Applicants may indicate a range for funding requested from the Act (e.g. \$100,000 to \$250,000) for restoration and research pre-proposals and full proposals, and Regional Project proposals, which will indicate to the PRC that the proposals scope of work and budget is negotiable or scalable.

If an applicant selected for funding hasn't finished their SAM.gov registration (see [2 CFR 25.200](#) and [2 CFR 25.110](#)) when the federal agency is ready to make an award, we may decide that the applicant is ineligible for the award and choose to grant it to someone else. Depending on approval by the Midwest Region 3 Regional Director and funding availability, successful restoration and research and Regional Project proposal applicants can anticipate receiving an official grant or cooperative agreement between January and March 2027. The agreement serves as the official notice of award to the applicant and provides important

information on the details of the agreement and expectations of both the Service and recipient for the life of the agreement.

Successful applicants will receive an email between January and March 2027 from GrantSolutions notifying them the award letter or financial agreement (grant or cooperative) has been awarded.
