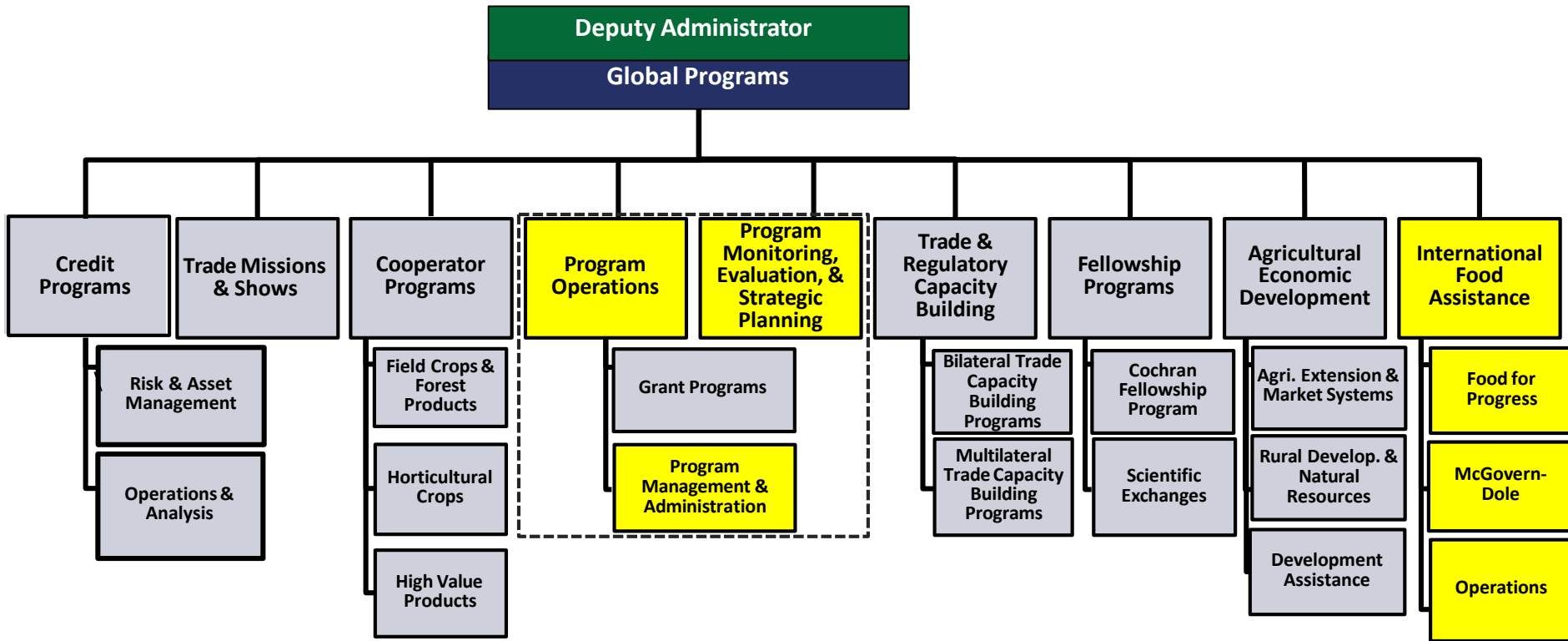

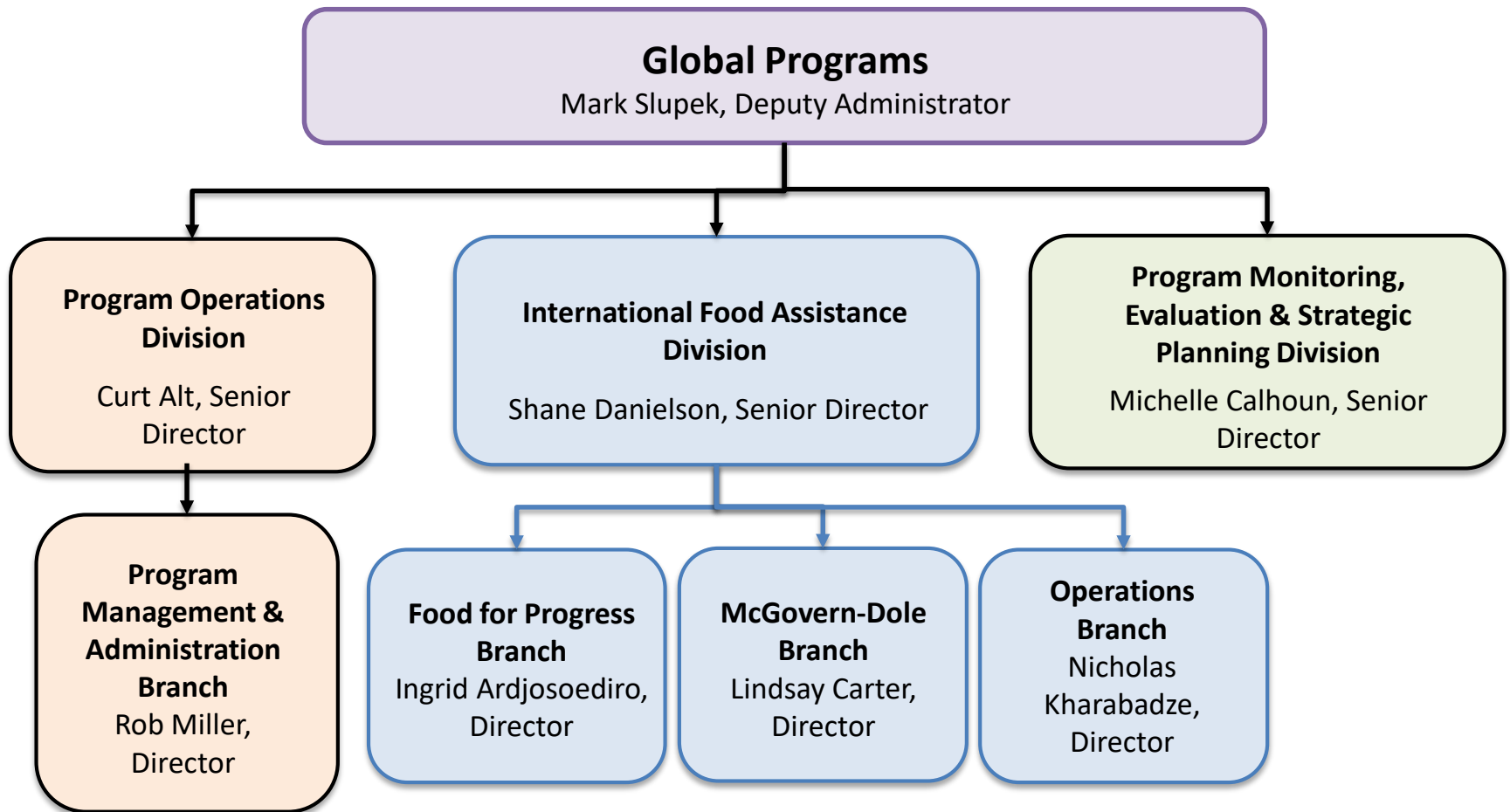

Local and Regional Procurement of Commodities

- Authorized under the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018
- Up to 10 percent of McGovern-Dole program funds and not less than \$20 million
- Local and Regional Commodities are defined as:
 - Those produced in and procured from either a target developing country or a developed country in the target region
 - Meeting the nutritional, quality, and labeling standard of the target country
- Appropriate uses of locally- and regionally-procured commodities include:
 - Enhancing project sustainability
 - Improving dietary diversity in school meals
 - Mitigating pipeline breaks
 - Targeting specific populations (i.e. pregnant and lactating women, children under 5)

Donation of U.S. commodities remain an integral part of McGovern-Dole

Methodology for Literacy

Applicants should consider:

- Incorporating USAID Reading MATTERS Conceptual Framework
- Evidence-based approaches to support reading acquisition for all children, including the marginalized and vulnerable
- Coordination, collaboration, and co-location with USAID Education, where feasible

 - “Increased Use of Health, Nutrition and Dietary Practices” (SO2)
- Continued importance of Nutrition
- Sustainability and Lasting Impact
- Consideration for USG Global Strategies and Initiatives
- Coordination and collaboration with other USG actors, development partners, and host country governments.

SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT

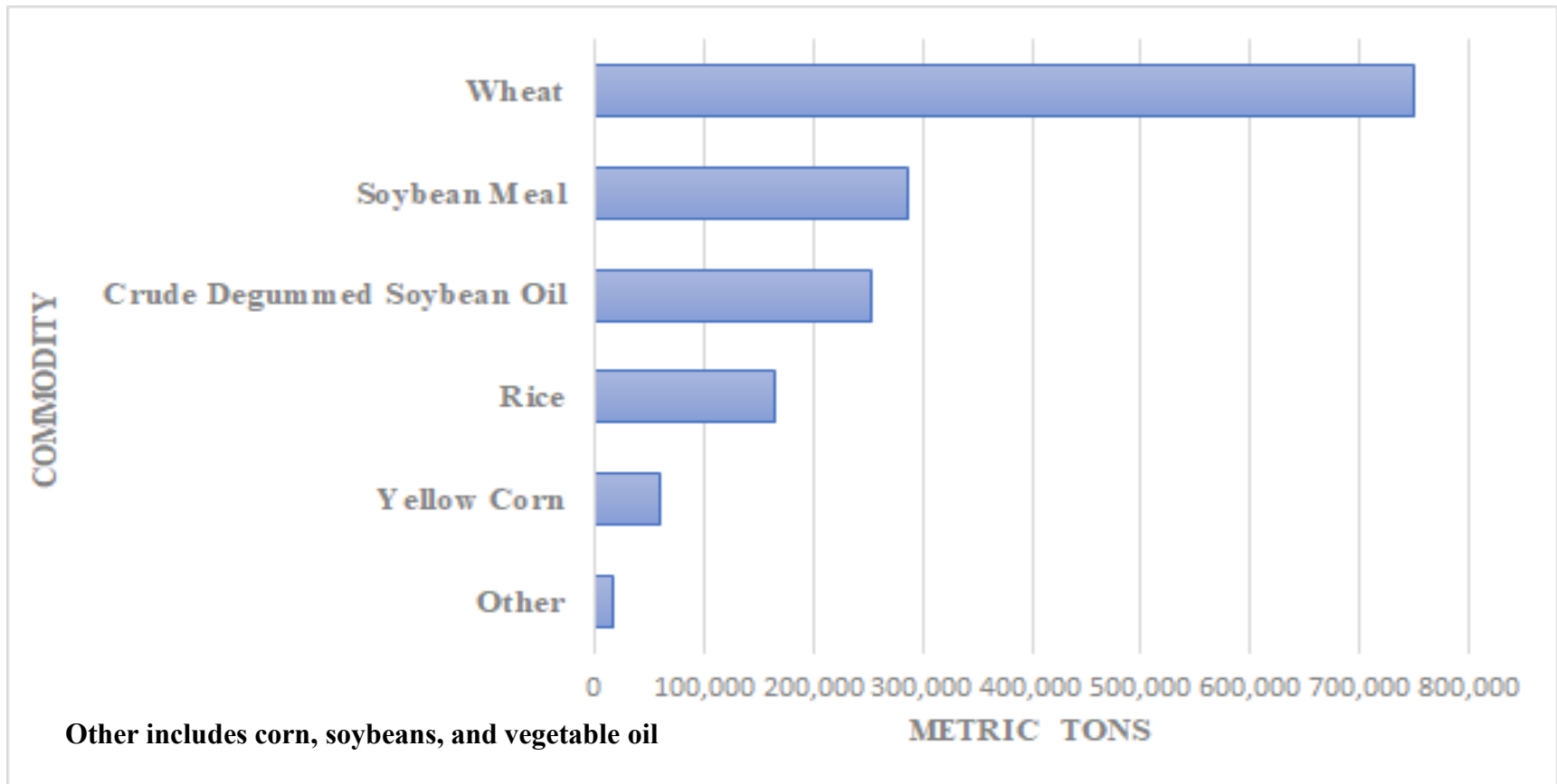

Monetization - Do's and Don'ts

Do!

- Include market assessment of all commodities considered for monetization
 - Identify factors that dictate import price fluctuations of commodities considered
- Include an impact analysis of proposed monetization tonnage on commercial markets, trading partners, local production, and on other similar commodities
- Address how unexpected increases or decreases in sale proceeds will be distributed across program activities
- Select commodities where the sales prices is at least equal to the average FOB export price
- Establish realistic Rate of Return and factors that influence it
 - Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018

Monetization - Do's and Don'ts (cont.)

Don't!

- Don't make general market assumptions unless providing specific evidence of support
 - Data to include but not limited to - production/consumption/imports/export trends
- Don't gloss over specific country concerns
 - Including import barriers, tariffs, biotech regulations, sales and payment terms, etc.
 - Don't assume monetization will be exempt from Customs, Duties, and Taxes
- Don't select commodities that will result in a significant budget shortfall
- Don't assume that the monetization will take place within the first quarter of the fiscal year
- Don't forget to budget for Post Monetization Assessment Studies

Commodity Management

- **Introduction:** The Operation Branch's role within the International Food Assistance Division
 - **Bulk Commodity Purchases:** Bulk purchases are made individually on an ad hoc basis
 - **Packaged Commodity Purchases:** Packaged procurements follow a schedule published by Kansas City Commodities Office; procurements run twice monthly

Submitting a Strong Proposal

- Commodity procurement tonnages must be rounded to the nearest multiple of 10 metric tons.
- Warehousing and port information in comparison with proposed tonnages
- Budgets must be built on U.S. flagging to ensure no budget shortfalls
- How will the commodities be shipped and delivered?
 - B/L OR through Bill of Lading
 - Third party contractors (surveyors, freight forwarders)
- How will the economic impact of the monetized commodity be measured?

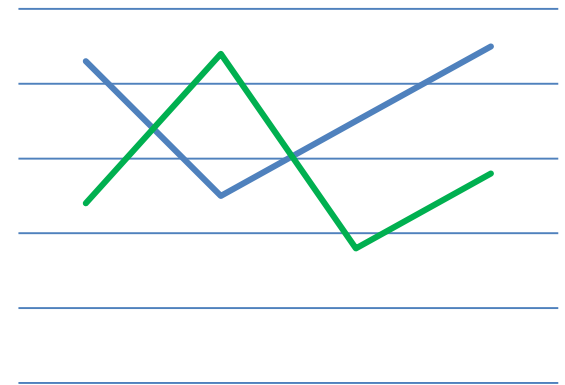

Strong M&E Proposals

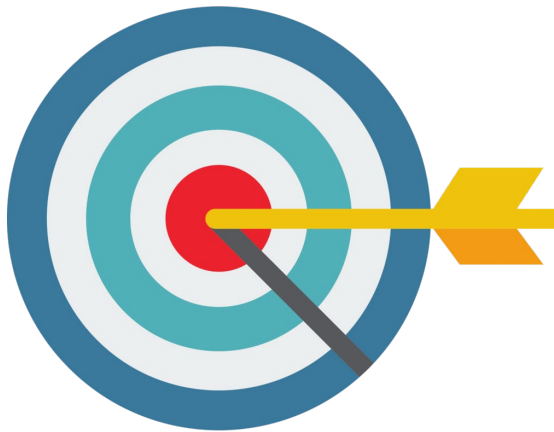
A strong Results Framework:

- *(In the graphic)*: Clearly reflects the results the proposed project will and will not contribute to, and meaningfully links activities to results
- *(In the narrative)*: Cites evidence to support the theory of change, includes critical assumptions, and if applicable explains why the proposed project will not contribute to some results



Strong M&E Proposals

A strong Performance Indicator Table:



- Includes all relevant standard indicators
- Includes a limited number of well-constructed custom indicators
- Includes all estimated baseline values
- Accurately links annual and life-of-project targets

Strong M&E Proposals

A strong Evaluation Plan:

- Proposes a specific evaluation design
 - *If not an impact evaluation, explains why*
- Aligns meaningfully with the Learning Agenda
- Describes the project population and proposes a sampling methodology
- Addresses learning in the new “Learning” section
