The Public Diplomacy Section – Mission Mexico of the U.S. Department of State is pleased to announce that funding is available through its Public Diplomacy Grants Program. This is an Annual Program Statement, outlining our funding priorities, the strategic themes we focus on, and the procedures for submitting requests for funding. Please carefully follow all instructions below.

Funding Instrument Type: Grant or cooperative agreement.

Project Performance Period: Proposed projects should be completed in 18 months or less. The Department of State will entertain applications for continuation grants funded under these awards beyond the initial budget period on a non-competitive basis subject to availability of funds, satisfactory progress of the program, and a determination that continued funding would be in the best interest of the U.S. Department of State.

This notice is subject to availability of funding. The Public Diplomacy Section reserves the right to award less or more than the funds described under circumstances deemed to be in the best interest of the U.S. government, pending the availability of funds and approval of the designated grants officer.

2. Executive Summary

The U.S. Department of State’s Public Diplomacy Mission Mexico announces an open competition to implement a program to strengthen cultural ties and mutual understanding between the U.S. and Mexico through cultural, economic, security, educational, professional, and

exchange programming that highlights shared values and promotes bilateral cooperation. All programs must include a U.S. cultural element, or connection with U.S. expert/s, organization/s, or institution/s in a specific field that will promote increased understanding of U.S. policies and perspectives. Programs that include multiple states and/or promote increased collaboration and networking between U.S. government program alumni are encouraged.

Please follow all instructions below.

B. ELIGIBILITY

1. Eligible Applicants

The following organizations are eligible to apply:

- *Not-for-profit organizations, including think tanks and civil society/non-governmental organizations*
- *Public and private educational institutions*
- *Individuals*
- *Public International Organizations and Governmental institutions*

For-profit entities, even those that may fall into the categories listed above, are **not** eligible to apply for this APS. Organizations may sub-contract with other entities, but only one, non-profit, non-governmental entity can be the prime recipient of the award. When sub-contracting with other entities, the responsibilities of each entity must be clearly defined in the proposal. For more information on the difference between sub-contract and sub-recipient, please refer to 2 CFR 200.[331](#).

2. Cost Sharing or Matching

Cost sharing or matching is encouraged but not required for this funding opportunity.

3. Other Eligibility Requirements

All organizations must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) issued via SAM.gov as well as a valid registration in SAM.gov. Please see Section E.3 for more information. Individuals are not required to have a UEI or be registered in SAM.gov.

Applicants are only allowed to submit one proposal per organization. If more than one proposal is submitted from an organization, all proposals from that institution will be considered ineligible for funding under this funding opportunity.

4. *This opportunity will not support:*

- Projects relating to partisan political activity;
- Charitable or development activities; including direct social services such as medical, psychological, and/or humanitarian support;
- Construction projects;
- Projects that support specific religious activities;
- Fund-raising campaigns;
- Lobbying for specific legislation or programs;
- Scientific research or surveys;
- Commercial projects;
- Projects intended primarily for the growth or institutional development of the organization;
- Projects that duplicate existing projects; or
- Illegal activities.

C. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

1. Project Background, Goals, and Objectives

The Public Diplomacy Section – Mission Mexico invites proposals for programs that support one of the following U.S. Embassy priority program areas listed below.

Examples of Public Diplomacy Small Grants Program programs include, but are not limited to:

- Academic and professional lectures, seminars and speaker programs;
- Artistic and cultural workshops, joint performances and exhibitions;
- Professional and academic exchanges and programs;
- Promotion of entrepreneurship.

Goal 1. Freedom 250: Showcasing American Innovation and Shared Values

The Freedom 250 theme leverages the United States' 250th anniversary to highlight American innovation and bilateral cooperation with Mexico. This priority addresses the need to strengthen mutual understanding, expand access to technology and skills, and reinforce shared commitments to security. Programs under this theme integrate AI and tech innovation into American Spaces, promote cultural preservation and education, and engage key communities to deepen awareness of U.S. values and foster strategic collaboration.

Past PDS efforts have demonstrated the impact of combining heritage preservation with cutting-edge innovation. Lessons learned emphasize the importance of cross-sector collaboration and creating hands-on opportunities that connect youth and communities to U.S. values and technological leadership.

Project Audience(s):

- Individuals and organizations interested in implementing English-language learning programs, American culture activities, and job-skills training for youth throughout Mexico;
- Alumni of U.S. government-sponsored exchange programs;
- Communities and stakeholders involved in cultural preservation and innovation-focused initiatives across Mexico.

Priority Outcomes(s): Applicants may focus on one or more of the outcomes listed below. Applicants are encouraged to propose additional objectives and innovative activities that address the priority program areas.

- Increase collaboration between U.S. and Mexican communities through cultural preservation and innovation-focused programming;
- Strengthen technology and digital skills among youth and community leaders through partnerships with U.S. tech companies;
- Expand awareness of American values, innovation, and bilateral cooperation through Freedom 250-related programs and alumni initiatives.

Goal 2. Countering the Influence of Adversarial Actors

This theme addresses the growing influence of adversarial actors across Mexico's educational, technological, and institutional sectors. This priority is essential to ensuring that U.S. values, democratic principles, and innovation remain the preferred alternatives for Mexican communities. Programs under this theme strengthen U.S. competitiveness by expanding American Spaces with cutting-edge technology, promoting U.S.-backed workforce development certifications, and reinforcing U.S. leadership in education, entrepreneurship, security, and research collaboration.

Past initiatives demonstrate the effectiveness of combining strategic partnerships with local governments and universities to grow the American Spaces network, including the opening of two new affiliate spaces in 2026.

Project Audience(s):

- University students and young professionals seeking skills in technology, innovation, AI, and entrepreneurship;
- Communities and partners engaged with American Spaces, including local governments, universities, and civil society organizations;
- Individuals and organizations aiming to promote U.S.-style education, English-language programs, and job-skills training throughout Mexico.

Priority Outcomes(s): Applicants may focus on one or more of the outcomes listed below. Applicants are encouraged to propose additional objectives and innovative activities that address the priority program areas.

- Increase preference for U.S. educational models, technology resources, and democratic values among key Mexican audiences;
- Expand access to U.S.-supported workforce development programs, including certifications in AI, engineering, and digital innovation;
- Strengthen strategic partnerships that reinforce U.S. leadership and counter adversarial influence across cultural, educational, and technological sectors.

Goal 3. Dismantling Cartels and Combatting Fentanyl

Public Diplomacy programs target criminal recruitment and strengthen law enforcement capabilities, which directly support U.S. security and the safety of American citizens in Mexico. Programs under this theme build resilience among vulnerable communities and enhance professional skills for key security actors.

Past initiatives, including Sports Diplomacy programs, have successfully reduced youth vulnerability to criminal recruitment and improved operational coordination between Mexican and U.S. partners. Professional exchanges have also demonstrated long-term impact by equipping Mexican leaders with skills and networks to strengthen security efforts.

Project Audience(s):

- Youth and communities aiming to promote positive values and leadership;
- Law enforcement, first responders, and stadium/event security personnel;
- Emerging leaders and professionals working in areas related to counternarcotics, crime prevention, or justice sector reform.

Priority Outcomes(s): Applicants may focus on one or more of the outcomes listed below. Applicants are encouraged to propose additional objectives and innovative activities that address the priority program areas.

- Increase community resilience and reduce vulnerability of at-risk youth to criminal recruitment through positive engagement and leadership development;
- Strengthen operational cooperation between Mexican and U.S. law enforcement and emergency personnel through improving English proficiency and communication skills;

Enhance capacity of Mexican professionals to counter drug trafficking, dismantle illicit networks, and collaborate on transnational security issues.

Goal 4. Highlighting the U.S. as Partner of Choice

The United States remains the leading destination for academic, professional, and cultural exchange, and strengthening this perception is central to advancing U.S. strategic interests in Mexico. This priority addresses the need to reinforce trust, collaboration, and alignment with

U.S. institutions in a competitive global landscape. Programs under this theme showcase American excellence, deepen bilateral cooperation, and connect Mexican audiences with high-quality U.S. educational, cultural, and professional opportunities.

Past projects including EducationUSA advising, state government–funded training programs, professional exchanges, and cultural diplomacy initiatives have demonstrated strong demand for U.S. engagement and yielded valuable lessons in targeted outreach, institutional partnerships, and the importance of sustained, in-person engagement.

Project Audience(s):

- Students, educators, and academic administrators that promote/implement U.S. study opportunities;
- Government officials, civil society leaders, and professionals participating in exchanges or training programs;
- Cultural, creative, and English-teaching communities, repatriation initiatives.

Priority Outcomes(s): Applicants may focus on one or more of the outcomes listed below. Applicants are encouraged to propose additional objectives and innovative activities that address the priority program areas.

- Increase visibility and credibility of U.S. higher education, professional training, and cultural institutions as Mexico’s preferred partners;
- Strengthen bilateral collaboration through expanding professional exchanges, academic advising networks, and state-level partnerships;
- Enhance engagement with Mexican audiences through cultural diplomacy, showcasing American creativity, innovation, and respect for shared heritage.

Goal 5. Advancing Trade and Reducing Deficit

This priority supports the need for a skilled, future-ready workforce that can meet the demands of North America’s rapidly expanding high-tech industries. Strengthening Mexico’s participation in sectors such as semiconductors, aerospace, and advanced manufacturing is essential to the economic security and competitiveness of both nations. Public Diplomacy programs under this theme help build technical talent, expand educational partnerships, and connect Mexican institutions to U.S. industry standards and innovation.

Past initiatives including the Mexico-U.S. Semiconductor Industry Collaboration Forum, have demonstrated the effectiveness of cross-border collaboration in meeting workforce development needs.

Project Audience(s):

- Students, educators, and trainees in high-tech fields such as semiconductors, aerospace, automotive manufacturing, AI, and STEM;
- Technical, vocational and educational institutions seeking alignment with U.S. industry and

workforce requirements;

- Workforce development leaders, policymakers engaged in regional economic competitiveness.

Priority Outcomes(s): Applicants may focus on one or more of the outcomes listed below.

Applicants are encouraged to propose additional objectives and innovative activities that address the priority program areas.

- Strengthen workforce readiness in Mexico’s high-tech sectors through training, English language programs, and U.S. industry-aligned skill development;
- Expand U.S.-Mexico collaboration through academic exchanges, research partnerships, and technical training initiatives that support regional supply chain integration;
- Enhance economic resilience and bilateral prosperity by preparing a 21st-century workforce equipped for emerging industries across North America.

D. APPLICATION CONTENTS AND FORMAT

Please follow all instructions below carefully. Proposals that do not meet the requirements of this announcement or fail to comply with the stated requirements will be ineligible.

Content of Application

Please ensure:

- The proposal clearly addresses the goals and objectives of this funding opportunity
- All documents are in English
- All budgets are in U.S. dollars
- All applicant authorized signatures are provided where indicated on the various, required forms.

The following documents are **required**:

1. Mandatory application forms

- SF-424 (Application for Federal Assistance – organizations) or SF-424-I (Application for Federal Assistance --individuals) at [grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov).
- SF-424A (Budget Information for Non-Construction programs) at [grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov)
- SF-424B (Assurances for Non-Construction programs) at [grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov) (note: the SF-424B is only required for individuals, organizations exempt from registration, and for organizations not required to fully register in SAM.gov)

2. Proposal (5 pages maximum)

Applicants must submit a complete narrative proposal in a format of their choice. The proposal should contain sufficient information that anyone not familiar with it would understand exactly what the applicant wants to do. The proposal must include all the items below:

- **Proposal Summary:** Short narrative that outlines the proposed project, including project objectives and anticipated impact.

- **Introduction to the Organization or Individual applying:** A description of past and present operations, showing ability to carry out the program, including information on all previous grants from the State Department and/or U.S. government agencies as well as experience with and expertise in areas related to those described in the APS.
- **Problem Statement:** Clear, concise and well-supported statement of the problem to be addressed and why the proposed program is needed
- **Program Methods, Design, Activities, and Deliverables:** The “goals” describe what the program is intended to achieve. The “objectives” refer to the intermediate accomplishments on the way to the goals. These should be achievable and measurable. Describe the program activities and how they will help achieve the objectives.
- **Proposed Project Schedule and Timeline:** The proposed timeline for the program activities. Include the dates, times, and locations of planned activities and events.
- **Key Personnel:** Names, titles, roles and experience/qualifications of key personnel involved in the program. What proportion of their time will be used in support of this program?
- **Project Partners:** List the names and type of involvement of key partner organizations and sub-awardees (if applicable).
- **Monitoring & Evaluation Plan:** Proposals must include a Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Performance Monitoring Plan (PMP). The M&E plan should show how applicants intend to measure and demonstrate progress towards the project’s objectives and goals. The key components to the PMP are as follows:
 - **Monitoring and Evaluation Narrative:** In narrative form, applicants should describe how they intend to monitor and evaluate the activities of their award. In addition, the applicant should describe any M&E processes, including key personnel, management structure (where M&E fits into the overall program’s staff structure), technology, and as well provide a brief budget narrative explaining any line-item expenditures for M&E listed in the program’s budget. If the proposal is from a prior grantee, the proposal discusses how the grantee has adapted, improved or otherwise modified their approach based on learning from previous experience. This narrative is limited to two pages.
 - **Theory of Change Diagram:** Applicants are expected to submit either a Theory of Change diagram or an If-Then Statement that illustrates how project activities will lead to intended outcomes.
 - **Monitoring and Evaluation Datasheet:** The applicant must include their proposed activities and their expected outputs and outcomes as well as the goals and objectives as written in the APS. The datasheet’s purpose is to explicitly illustrate how a project’s activities lead to tangible results (such as increased beneficiary skills, knowledge, or attitudes) that ultimately address a PDS objective.
 - The selected applicant’s M&E PMP is subject to review and approval before any award will be issued under this APS. The selected applicant may be asked to

work with U.S. Department of State Monitoring and Evaluation Specialists to ensure the applicant's M&E PMP achieves an expected level of expertise and meets PDS objectives.

- Expenses directly associated with monitoring and evaluation are considered allowable.

3. *Budget Justification Narrative*

- **Detailed Budget** - Applicants must submit a detailed line-item budget. Applicants are encouraged to utilize the template provided with the funding opportunity but are not required to do so. Line-item expenditures should be listed in the greatest possible detail. The budget must identify the total amount of funding requested, with a breakdown of amounts to be spent in the following budget categories: personnel; fringe benefits; travel; equipment; supplies; consultants/contracts; other direct costs; and indirect costs. See Annex Section I for a description of the types of costs that should be included in each category. Personnel salaries should include the level of effort and the rate of pay, which should cover the percentage of time each staff member will dedicate to grant-based activities. If an organization is charging an indirect cost rate without a NICRA, it must apply it to the modified total budget costs (MTDC), refer to 2CFR§200.1. **Budgets shall be submitted in U.S. dollars** and final grant agreements will be conducted in U.S. dollars.
- **Budget Justification Narrative** – Applicants must submit a budget justification narrative to accompany the detailed line-item budget. The purpose of the budget justification narrative is to supplement the information provided in the detailed budget spreadsheet by justifying how the budget cost elements are necessary to implement project objectives and accomplish the project goals. The budget justification narrative is a tool to help Embassy staff fully understand the budgetary needs of the applicant and is an opportunity to provide descriptive information about the requested costs beyond the constraints of the budget template. Together, the detailed budget spreadsheet, the budget justification narrative, and the SF-424A should provide a complete financial and qualitative description that supports the proposed project plan and should be directly relatable to the specific project components described in the applicant's proposal.

Additional Budget Notes:

- € Awards to Individuals: Please note the following budget guidelines for the Individual Award:

Salary/Honoraria: Only the award recipient may receive salary/honoraria from this funding mechanism. The Recipient must be the primary point of contact and manage all programmatic activities.

Contractual Costs: Additional individuals working on the award are only permissible through contracted services, as long as the services are not related to the core programmatic activities. Expenses for services such as accounting, legal support, social media management, website designer, etc., are allowable.

Other Direct Costs: Expenses related to securing venues, managing logistics, catering, etc. are allowable.

- € Audit Requirements: Please note the audit requirements for Department of State awards in the Standard Terms and Conditions <https://www.state.gov/m/a/o/e/index.htm> and [2CFR200](https://www.ecfr.gov/current/title-22/chapter-I/subchapter-F/part-200/subpart-F), Subpart F – Audit Requirements. The cost of the required audits may be charged either as an allowable direct cost to the award OR included in the organization's established indirect costs in the award's detailed budget.
- € Visa Fees: Include all visa application and related fees in your budget as applicable. Please note DS-2019s for post-funded programs must be submitted directly by the award recipient. If you anticipate your program will include the DS-2019 visa processing, your organization must be a registered Designated Sponsoring Organization. 4. *Attachments*

- **Key Personnel Resumes:** A résumé, not to exceed one page in length, must be included for the proposed key staff persons, such as the Project Director and Finance Officer, as well as any speakers or trainers (if applicable). If an individual for this type of position has not been identified, the applicant may submit a 1-page position description, identifying the qualifications and skills required for that position, in lieu of a résumé.
- **Letters of support from program partners:** Letters of support should be included for sub-recipients or other partners. The letters must identify the type of relationship to be entered into (formal or informal), the roles and responsibilities of each partner in relation to the proposed project activities, and the expected result of the partnership. The individual letters cannot exceed 1 page in length.
- **Indirect Costs:** If your organization has a Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (NICRA) and includes NICRA charges in the budget, your latest NICRA should be included in the application submission.
- **Proof of Non-profit Status:** Documentation to demonstrate the applicant's non-profit status (e.g., U.S.-based organizations should submit a copy of their 501(c)(3) Internal Revenue Service determination letter, and non-U.S. organizations should provide evidence of non-profit status issued by a government entity).
- **Proof of Registration:** A copy of the organization's registration should be provided with the proposal application. U.S.-based organizations should submit a copy of their IRS determination letter. Mexico-based organizations should submit a copy of their certificate of registration from the appropriate government organization.

Other items NOT required/requested with the application submission, but which *may* be requested if your application is approved to move forward in the review process include:

- a. Copies of an organization or program audit within the last two (2) years
- b. Copies of relevant human resources, financial, or procurement policies
- c. Copies of other relevant organizational policies or documentation that would help the Department determine your organization's capacity to manage a federal grant award overseas
- d. Documentation that demonstrates the recipients' plan and/or policy to safeguard PII of participants and beneficiaries. It is the responsibility of the recipient to ensure protection of personally identifiable information (PII) and safeguard PII when collecting, maintaining, using and disseminating such information
- e. Information to determine what financial controls and standard operating procedures an organization uses to procure goods and services, hire staff and track time and attendance, pay for grant-related travel, and identify other financial transactions that may be necessary to undertake the project activities
- f. The Embassy reserves the right to request any additional programmatic and/or financial information regarding the proposal.

3. Unique entity identifier and System for Award Management (SAM.gov)

Required Registration: All organizations, whether based in the United States or in another country, must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and an active registration in SAM.gov. A UEI is one of the data elements mandated by Public Law 109-282, the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), for all Federal awards.

An applicant must maintain an active registration while it has a proposal under review by the Department and must continue to keep the registration active for the entire duration of the period of performance of any Federal award that results from this APS.

The 2 CFR 200 also requires subrecipients to obtain a UEI. Please note the UEI for subrecipients is not required at the time of application but will be required before an award is processed and/or directed to a subrecipient.

Note: The process of obtaining or renewing a SAM.gov registration may take anywhere from 4-8 weeks. Please begin your registration as early as possible.

- Organizations **based in the United States** or that pay employees within the United States will need an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and a UEI prior to registering in SAM.gov.
- Organizations **based outside of the United States** and that do not pay employees within the United States do not need an EIN from the IRS but do need a UEI prior to registering in SAM.gov.
- **Organizations based outside of the United States that do not intend to apply for U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) awards are no longer required to have a NATO Commercial and Government Entity (NCAGE) code to apply for non-DoD foreign assistance funding opportunities.** If an applicant organization is mid-registration and wishes to remove an NCAGE code from their SAM.gov registration, the applicant should [submit a help desk ticket \(“incident”\)](#) with the Federal Service Desk (FSD) online at www.fsd.gov using the following language: “I do not intend to seek financial assistance from the Department of Defense. I do not wish to obtain an NCAGE code. I understand that I will need to submit my registration after this incident is resolved in order to have my registration activated.”

Organizations based outside of the United States and that DO NOT plan to do business with the DoD should follow the below instructions:

- Step 1: Proceed to SAM.gov to obtain a UEI and complete the SAM.gov registration process. SAM.gov registration must be renewed annually.

Exemptions

An exemption from the UEI and sam.gov registration requirements may be permitted on a case-by-case basis. See [2 CFR 25.110](#) for a full list of exemptions.

Organizations requesting exemption from UEI or SAM.gov requirements must email the point of contact listed in the APS at least two weeks prior to the deadline in the APS providing a justification of their request. Approval for a SAM.gov exemption must come from the warranted Grants Officer before the application can be deemed eligible for review.

Please note: Any applicant with an exclusion in the System for Award Management (SAM) is not eligible to apply for an assistance award in accordance with the OMB guidelines at 2 CFR 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 CFR, 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 CFR, 1989 Comp., p. 235), “Debarment and Suspension.”

4. Submission Dates and Times

Applications may be submitted for consideration at any time before the closing date of *August 10, 2026*. No applications will be accepted after that date.

5. Funding Restrictions

- i. Funding Restrictions for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA): None of the funds awarded resulting from this Notice of Funding Opportunity may be made available for subawards, direct financial support, or otherwise used to provide any payment or transfer to United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA).
- ii. Prohibition on Funding Activities that Encourage Mass-Migration Caravans towards the United States Southwest Border: None of the funds awarded under this grant may be made available to encourage, mobilize, publicize, or manage mass-migration caravans towards the United States southwest border. Funds may not be made available for legal counseling on the United States asylum process; and/or for referrals to legal representation in the United States.

Funds may only be used for cash cards for use in the country in which they are provided or to facilitate assisted voluntary returns and other purposes that do not encourage, mobilize, publicize, or manage mass migration caravans towards the United States southwest border. The provision of humanitarian assistance is permitted.

- iii. Certification Regarding Compliance with Applicable Federal Anti-Discrimination Laws” If the place of performance or delivery of any award made under this APS will be within the United States, applicants are advised that they will be required to certify the following at the time of award:

The proposals should demonstrate originality and outline clear, achievable objectives that align directly with the priorities and requirements of the APS. The proposal includes a reasonable implementation timeline, and the project scope is appropriate and clearly defined. Finally, the proposal aligns with the following:
 - The project clearly demonstrates a direct contribution to current U.S. foreign policy priorities.
 - The project will positively impact America’s reputation among foreign government partners.
 - The project will positively impact American’s reputation among foreign publics.
 - The proposal does not include any activities contrary to the following Executive Orders:

 - The project proposal demonstrates that the organization has sufficient expertise, skills, and human resources to implement the project, including internal controls in place to manage federal funds. If sub-awards are proposed, applicant demonstrates experience managing subawards.
 - The organization demonstrates that it has a clear understanding of the underlying issue that the project will address.

 - **Budget – 10 points:** The budget and narrative justification are sufficiently detailed. The budget demonstrates that the organization has devoted time to accurately determine expenses associated with the project instead of providing rough estimates. Costs are reasonable in relation to the proposed activities and anticipated results. The results and proposed outcomes justify the total cost of the project. Budget items are reasonable, allowable, and allocable.
 - **Monitoring and Evaluation - 10 points:** The project proposal includes an M&E plan. The applicant demonstrates it is able to measure program success against key indicators and provides milestones to indicate progress toward goals and objectives outlined in the proposal. The proposal includes output and outcome indicators and shows how and when those will be measured. Funded projects will have their plans finalized during the negotiation phase, and monitoring plans may be subject to periodic updates throughout the life of the project.

2. *Indirect Costs*

If two or more applications receive equivalent scores based on the evaluation criteria outlined in this APS, preference will be given to the applicant with the lower indirect cost rate, as consistent with Executive Order 14332, Section 4(b)(iii). Issuance of this APS does not constitute an award commitment on the part of the U.S. government, nor does it commit the U.S. government to pay for costs incurred in the preparation and submission of proposals. Further, the U.S. government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals received.

Recipients will be required to request payments by completing form SF-270—Request for Advance or Reimbursement and submitting the form to the Grants Officer and Grants Officer Representative.

Recipients may not draw down funds without the affirmative authorization of the Department of State. In addition, recipients must submit, with each SF-270 payment request, a detailed explanation justifying the request.
