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OVERVIEW, RECIPIENT AND NPS SUBSTANTIAL INVOLVEMENT

University of Montana (UMT) will collaborate with the National Park Service (NPS) by recruit a MS student who will collect data on whales, generate a study plan in which the student will write a multi-chapter thesis, participate in a series of cruises necessary to test methods for recording whale behavior, implement protocols for data collection, entry and archive, spearhead development of statistical modeling and analytical tools necessary, produce an end of year report and co-author any published material developed from this Agreement.

Substantial involvement on the part the National Park Service (NPS) is anticipated for the successful completion of the objectives to be funded by this award. NPS staff will provide equipment necessary for field work, schedule logistics for training, mutually work on preparation and review of study plan, provide previous years data collected, serve on graduate student committee, and attend a student committee meeting at least once per year, .

SINGLE-SOURCE JUSTIFICATION

SINGLE SOURCE POLICY REQUIREMENTS**

Department of the Interior Policy (505 DM 2) requires a written justification which explains why competition is not practicable for each single-source award. The justification must address one or more of the following criteria as well as discussion of the program legislative history, unique capabilities of the proposed recipient, and cost-sharing contribution offered by the proposed recipient, as applicable.

In order for an assistance award to be made without competition, the award must satisfy one or more of the following criteria:

- (1) Unsolicited Proposal – The proposed award is the result of an unsolicited assistance application which represents a unique or innovative idea, method, or approach which is not the subject of a current or planned contract or assistance award, but which is deemed advantageous to the program objectives;
- (2) Continuation – The activity to be funded is necessary to the satisfactory completion of, or is a continuation of an activity presently being funded, and for which competition would have a significant adverse effect on the continuity or completion of the activity;
- (3) Legislative intent – The language in the applicable authorizing legislation or legislative history clearly indicates Congress' intent to restrict the award to a particular

recipient of purpose;

- (4) Unique Qualifications – The applicant is uniquely qualified to perform the activity based upon a variety of demonstrable factors such as location, property ownership, voluntary support capacity, cost-sharing ability if applicable, technical expertise, or other such unique qualifications;
- (5) Emergencies – Program/award where there is insufficient time available (due to a compelling and unusual urgency, or substantial danger to health or safety) for adequate competitive procedures to be followed.

The National Park Service awarded this task to the University of Montana based on the following exception. University of Montana is a member of the NPS CESU network.¹

(4) Unique Qualifications -The cooperator is a member of an established **Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Unit (CESU)** network, and was awarded a Cooperative Agreement (P14AC00749) allowing UMT to participate in specific tasks, and can provide the specific research and investigative support to conduct this particular task while providing an effective outcome for the National Park Service and the research project. As such, the applicant is uniquely qualified to perform the activity based on their participation as a University Partner in the Cooperative Ecosystems Study Unit (CESU) their capacity to provide appropriate researchers, and their ability to broadly utilize research results as teaching tool.
