*2. Executive Summary*

The U.S. Department of State’s Embassy Jakarta announces an open competition to implement the AI Pathways to the Future program, a comprehensive initiative designed to strengthen U.S.-Indonesia partnerships in artificial intelligence education, research, and innovation.

Promoting AI innovation and security is a top priority of the United States government, including in its foreign policy. By deepening U.S. - Indonesia bilateral educational cooperation

in the field of AI, Indonesia's future AI innovators will build critical relationships with American technology, standards, and thought, thus strengthening pathways to long term collaborations and AI-ready workforces to boost unparalleled economic growth.

The program consists of two interconnected components:

### **Component 1: AI Pathways Workshop (Fall 2026)**

A multi-day workshop bringing together representatives from 2-3 U.S. higher education institutions (HEIs) with AI research hubs, 3-4 Indonesian universities exploring AI research partnerships, 1-2 U.S. technology companies, and AI-focused alumni of U.S. government exchange programs and U.S. universities. The workshop will engage Indonesian college students and faculty in discussions about AI innovation career pathways, and institutional development.

### **Component 2: Five-Month AI Innovation Mentorship Challenge**

Following the workshop, U.S. professors will launch mentoring relationships with Indonesian professors and high-performing students who will compete to build AI-powered solutions addressing pressing Jakarta infrastructure challenges such as waste management, flooding, traffic congestion, or urban planning. The challenge culminates in project presentations to an expert panel, with the winning solution receiving a certificate and being promoted through social media and press engagement.

Target Audiences:

- Indonesian university students interested in AI and technology careers
- Indonesian university faculty and administrators developing AI programs
- Indonesian education and AI policymakers
- STEM-focused high school students
- Alumni of U.S. Government exchange programs with AI expertise

### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Strengthened partnerships between U.S. and Indonesian higher education institutions in AI research.
- Increased Indonesian student interest in U.S. graduate programs in AI and related fields.
- Development of practical AI solutions to Indonesian infrastructure challenges.
- Enhanced understanding of U.S. opportunities in AI higher education and employment.
- Exploration of scholarship opportunities and potential Jakarta-based innovation hub development.
- EducationUSA advisers will participate throughout the program, providing information on pathways to U.S. study for students interested in graduate programs, conducting workshops, and offering one-to-one advising for program participants.

## **B. ELIGIBILITY**

### ***1. Eligible Applicants***

The following organizations are eligible to apply

- U.S. and Indonesian higher educational institutions.

For-profit entities, even those that may fall into the categories listed above, are **not** eligible to apply for this NOFO. Organizations may sub-contract with other entities, but only one, non-profit, non-governmental entity can be the prime recipient of the award. When sub-contracting with other entities, the responsibilities of each entity must be clearly defined in the proposal. ### ***2. Cost Sharing or Matching***

## C. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

### *1. Project Background, Goals, and Objectives*

#### **Background:**

Indonesia represents a critical partner for U.S. interests in the Indo-Pacific region. As the world's fourth most populous country and Southeast Asia's largest economy, Indonesia's technological development and innovation capacity have significant implications for regional stability, economic growth, and democratic governance.

As artificial intelligence rapidly transforms global economies, education systems, and societies, Indonesia has demonstrated strong interest in AI innovation, with President Prabowo offering significant incentives to encourage international partnerships in AI research and ingenuity. However, Indonesian universities and students face challenges in accessing world-class AI education, mentorship from leading experts, and pathways to advanced study and careers in AI fields – a challenge other nations such as China seek to benefit from by hosting double the amount of Indonesian students studying at their universities than the United States.

U.S. higher education institutions lead globally in AI research, innovation, and education. American technology companies are at the forefront of AI development and deployment. By connecting Indonesian students, faculty, and institutions with U.S. expertise, this program addresses critical gaps while advancing U.S. foreign policy objectives in the Indo-Pacific.

#### **Project Audience(s):**

##### Primary Audiences:

- **Indonesian university students (undergraduate and graduate):** Students interested in AI, computer science, data science, engineering, and related fields who seek practical experience, mentorship, and pathways to advanced study and careers.
- **Indonesian university faculty and administrators:** Professors and institutional leaders developing AI research programs, curricula, and partnerships who need connections with U.S. expertise and institutions.
- **High-performing Indonesian STEM-focused high school students:** Top students capable of competing in the AI Innovation Challenge and representing Indonesia's future AI leadership. Pre-university students who can be inspired to pursue AI and technology fields.

##### Secondary Audiences:

- **Indonesian education and AI policymakers:** Government officials shaping Indonesia's AI strategy, education policy, and innovation ecosystem.
- **Alumni of U.S. Government exchange programs:** Returned alumni with AI expertise who can serve as mentors, role models, and program ambassadors.

- **U.S. higher education institutions:** Universities with AI research hubs seeking partnerships and recruitment opportunities in Indonesia.
- **U.S. technology companies:** Companies interested in talent development, corporate social responsibility, and market engagement in Indonesia.

Audience Characteristics:

- **Geographic Location:** Primarily Bandung and Jakarta, with potential reach to Sekolah Unggul Garuda ecosystem.
- **Age Group:** University students (18-25), faculty (30-60), high school students (16-18).
- **Profession:** Students, educators, researchers, policymakers, technology professionals
- **Educational Background:** Current university enrollment or faculty positions; high academic achievement for competition participants.
- **English Proficiency:** Sufficient English to engage in technical discussions and mentorship.

**Project Goal:**

To advance U.S. strategic interests in the Indo-Pacific and AI leadership by strengthening U.S.-Indonesia partnerships in artificial intelligence education, research, and innovation, positioning the United States as Indonesia’s preferred partner for technological advancement and higher education.

**Project Objectives:**

Objective 1: Strengthen U.S.-Indonesia Institutional Partnerships in AI

- Establish formal partnership agreements or memoranda of understanding between U.S. higher education institutions and Indonesian universities by the end of the program.
- Facilitate at least 3 substantive discussions between U.S. HEIs and Indonesian education/AI policymakers exploring scholarship opportunities and innovation hub development.
- Document at least 2 concrete follow-on collaboration initiatives (research projects, student exchanges, joint programs) planned or initiated during the program period.

Objective 2: Increase Indonesian Student Engagement with U.S. AI and Education

- Engage at least 100 Indonesian elite university students in the AI Pathways Workshop discussions and activities.
- Provide EducationUSA advising (workshops and one-to-one sessions) to at least 50 program participants interested in U.S. study.
- Achieve at least 30 applications to U.S. undergraduate and graduate programs in AI and related fields from program participants within one academic year.

- Reach at least 50 STEM-focused high school students through the final showcase workshop.

### Objective 3: Develop Practical AI Solutions to Indonesian Infrastructure Challenges

- Recruit and support at least 5 high school student teams and 5 university student teams (approximately 60 students total) to participate in the Five-Month AI Innovation Mentorship Challenge.
- Facilitate at least 10 virtual mentoring sessions between U.S. professors and Indonesian student teams.
- Produce at least 4 functional AI-powered applications addressing Jakarta infrastructure challenges (waste management, flooding, traffic congestion, or urban planning).
- Select and promote 2 winning solutions through at least 10 media placements (social media, press interviews, articles).

### Objective 4: Build Sustainable AI Knowledge and Mentorship Networks

- Engage at least 4 AI-focused alumni of U.S. government exchange programs and U.S. universities as workshop speakers, mentors, or judges.
- Engage at least 2 Indonesian professors/ faculties as mentors, or judges.
- Establish ongoing communication channels (online communities, mailing lists) connecting at least 50 program participants for continued engagement.
- Document and share best practices, lessons learned, and program models for potential replication in other Indonesian cities or countries.

### **Project Activities:**

The recipient will be expected to conduct the following activities:

#### **Phase 1: Planning and Recruitment (September – October 2026)**

- Develop detailed workshop agenda, competition guidelines, and program timeline in coordination with U.S. Embassy Jakarta.
- Recruit and confirm participation of 1-2 U.S. higher education institutions with AI research hubs.
- Recruit and confirm participation of 5-6 Indonesian universities interested in AI partnerships.
- Recruit and confirm participation of 1-2 U.S. technology companies.
- Identify and recruit 4 AI-focused alumni of U.S. Government exchange programs and U.S. universities.
- Identify and recruit 2 Indonesian professors/ faculties.
- Develop marketing and outreach materials to recruit student participants.
- Coordinate with EducationUSA advisers on integration of advising services.

## **Phase 2: AI Pathways Workshop (November 2026)**

- Organize and facilitate multi-day workshop in Indonesia bringing together all stakeholder groups.
- Conduct panel discussions and interactive sessions on topics including:
  - Practical AI applications: How can AI help solve urban traffic, flood, and waste management challenges? How do we start?
  - Optimizing AI technologies: How can societies maximize benefits while addressing risks?
  - Skills and career pathways: What skills are needed to compete in the AI industry? How do students obtain those skills?
  - Employment preparation: How do students position themselves for post-graduation employment? What are U.S. companies looking for?
  - Institutional strategies: What are practical approaches institutions can implement while exploring longer-term governance, policy, and ethical considerations?
- Facilitate networking sessions between U.S. HEI representatives and Indonesian university leaders and U.S. alumni.
- Organize separate discussions between U.S. HEIs and Indonesian education/AI policymakers on partnership and scholarship opportunities, including Jakarta-based innovation hub development.
- Hold EducationUSA information sessions on pathways to U.S. study.
- Launch the Five-Month AI Innovation Mentorship Challenge, including:
  - Presentation of challenge parameters and infrastructure problems to address
  - Team formation and registration
  - Introduction of U.S., Indonesian professor and alumni mentors
  - Distribution of competition guidelines and resources

## **Phase 3: Five-Month AI Innovation Mentorship Challenge (November 2026 – April 2027)**

- Facilitate regular virtual mentoring sessions (at least bi-weekly) between U.S. professors, Indonesian professors, alumni and Indonesian student teams.
- Provide technical support, resources, and guidance to participating teams.
- Conduct mid-program EducationUSA workshops for participants interested in U.S. study.
- Offer one-to-one EducationUSA advising sessions for interested students.
- Monitor team progress and provide troubleshooting support.
- Organize interim check-ins and progress presentations.
- Maintain communication with U.S. HEI partners and mentors.
- Document program activities, participant experiences, and emerging outcomes.

## **Phase 4: Competition Conclusion and Showcase (April 2027)**

- Organize final competition event where teams present their AI-powered applications.
- Convene expert panel (including U.S. technology company representatives) to evaluate submissions.
- Select winning proposal based on criteria including functionality, innovation, practical applicability, and potential impact.

- Conduct awards ceremony and recognition event.
- Organize showcase workshop for both university and STEM-focused high school students featuring:
  - Winning team presentation of their AI solution
  - U.S. sponsor professor perspectives on the project and collaboration
  - Discussion of U.S. opportunities in AI higher education
  - EducationUSA information on pathways to U.S. study
- Implement comprehensive media and communications strategy including:
  - Social media campaign promoting winning solution and program outcomes.
  - Press interviews with winning team, U.S. partners, and Embassy representatives.
- Conduct final EducationUSA advising sessions and follow-up with interested students.
- Complete program evaluation and final reporting.

### **Throughout program:**

- Maintain regular communication and coordination with U.S. Embassy Jakarta Public Diplomacy Section.
- Monitor and evaluate all program activities and outcomes; document best practices, challenges, and lessons learned; and maintain participant databases and communication channels.
- Ensure appropriate branding and marking of all program materials.
- Manage budget and financial reporting requirements.

## ***2. Substantial Involvement***

This award will be structured as an FAA with substantial involvement from the U.S. Embassy Jakarta Public Diplomacy Section. The substantial involvement will include:

### **U.S. Embassy Roles and Responsibilities:**

- **Strategic Guidance:** Provide overall strategic direction for the program to ensure alignment with U.S. foreign policy priorities and Mission Indonesia objectives.
- **Stakeholder Engagement:** Facilitate introductions and meetings between program participants and Indonesian government officials, education policymakers, and other key stakeholders.
- **U.S. HEI and Company Recruitment Support:** Leverage Embassy networks to assist in recruiting U.S. higher education institutions and technology companies to participate.
- **High-Level Event Participation:** Provide Embassy representation at the AI Pathways Workshop, competition conclusion event, and other key program activities.
- **Media and Communications Support:** Coordinate media engagement, press interviews, and social media promotion of program activities and outcomes.
- **Policy Dialogue Facilitation:** Organize and participate in discussions between U.S. HEIs and Indonesian education/AI policymakers regarding partnerships, scholarships, and innovation hub development.
- **EducationUSA Integration:** Ensure effective integration of EducationUSA advising services throughout the program.

- **Program Monitoring:** Conduct regular check-ins with recipient to monitor progress, address challenges, and ensure quality implementation.
- **Approval Authority:** Review and approve program decisions including workshop agenda, competition guidelines, expert panel composition, and communications materials.

#### **Award recipient Roles and Responsibilities:**

- **Program Management:** Serve as primary implementer responsible for day-to-day program management, logistics, and coordination.
- **Participant Recruitment:** Lead recruitment efforts for Indonesian university and STEM-focused high school students, faculty, and institutions.
- **Event Organization:** Plan and execute all program events including the AI Pathways Workshop, mentorship sessions, and competition conclusion.
- **Technical Support:** Provide technical guidance and support to student teams throughout the AI Innovation Challenge.
- **Mentorship Coordination:** Facilitate connections and ongoing communication between U.S. and Indonesian professor mentors, US Alumni and Indonesian student teams.
- **Financial Management:** Manage program budget, procurement, vendor contracts, and financial reporting in accordance with federal regulations.
- **Monitoring and Evaluation:** Implement M&E plan, collect data, track outcomes, and report on program impact.
- **Communications Production:** Develop program materials, social media content, and documentation of program activities.
- **Coordination:** Maintain regular communication with U.S. Embassy Jakarta and respond to requests for information, updates, and adjustments.
- **Compliance:** Ensure compliance with all applicable federal regulations, award terms and conditions, and Department of State requirements.

The recipient and U.S. Embassy Jakarta will maintain regular communication throughout the program period, with formal check-in meetings at least monthly and informal communication as needed. Program decisions will be made collaboratively, with final approval authority resting with the U.S. Embassy Jakarta.

Applicants must submit a complete narrative proposal in a format of their choice, or they may use the attached proposal template if they like (Attachment Proposal Template). The proposal should contain sufficient information that anyone not familiar with it would understand exactly what the applicant wants to do. The proposal must include all the items below:

- **Proposal Summary:** Short narrative (1 page maximum) that outlines the proposed project, including project objectives and anticipated impact.
- **Introduction to the Organization:** A description of past and present operations, showing ability to carry out the program, including information on all previous grants from the State Department and/or U.S. government agencies as well as experience with and expertise in areas related to those described in the NOFO. Include:
  - Organizational history and mission
  - Experience managing similar programs (AI education, international partnerships, student competitions, etc.)
  - Experience working with U.S. higher education institutions and/or technology companies
  - Experience working in Indonesia and understanding of Indonesian higher education context
  - Organizational capacity including staff expertise, financial management systems, and operational infrastructure
  - Previous U.S. Government grants (if any) and performance record

Personnel salaries should include the level of effort and the rate of pay, which should cover the percentage of time each staff member will dedicate to grant-based activities. - **Budget Justification Narrative** – Applicants must submit a budget justification narrative to accompany the detailed line-item budget. The purpose of the budget justification narrative is to supplement the information provided in the detailed budget spreadsheet by justifying how the budget cost elements are necessary to implement project objectives and accomplish the project goals. The budget justification narrative is a tool to help Embassy staff fully understand the budgetary needs of the applicant and is an opportunity to provide descriptive information about the requested costs beyond the constraints of the budget template. Together, the detailed budget spreadsheet, the budget justification narrative, and the SF-424A should provide a complete financial and qualitative description that supports the proposed project plan and should be directly relatable to the specific project components described in the applicant’s proposal.

If an individual for this type of position has not been identified, the applicant may submit a 1-page position description, identifying the qualifications and skills required for that position, in lieu of a résumé.
- **Letters of support from program partners:** Letters of support should be included for sub-recipients or other partners. The letters must identify the type of relationship to be entered into (formal or informal), the roles and responsibilities of each partner in relation

to the proposed project activities, and the expected result of the partnership. The individual letters cannot exceed 1 page in length.

## 3. Unique entity identifier and System for Award Management (SAM.gov)

**Required Registration:** All organizations, whether based in the United States or in another country, must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and an active registration in SAM.gov. A UEI is one of the data elements mandated by Public Law 109-282, the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), for all Federal awards.

An applicant must maintain an active registration while it has a proposal under review by the Department and must continue to keep the registration active for the entire duration of the period of performance of any Federal award that results from this NOFO.

Criteria: Each application submitted under this announcement will be evaluated and rated on the basis of the criteria enumerated below. The criteria are designed to assess the quality of the proposed project, and to determine the likelihood of its success.

- **Quality and Feasibility of the Program Idea** – 30 points: The program idea should be innovative and well developed, with sufficient detail about how project activities will be carried out. The proposals should demonstrate originality and outline clear, achievable objectives that align directly with the priorities and requirements of the NOFO. The proposal includes a reasonable implementation timeline, and the project scope is appropriate and clearly defined. Finally, the proposal aligns with the following:
  - The project clearly demonstrates a direct contribution to current U.S. foreign policy priorities.
  - The project will positively impact America’s reputation among foreign government partners.
  - The project will positively impact American’s reputation among foreign publics.
  - The proposal does not include any activities contrary to the following Executive Orders:
    - Executive Order 14173: ["Ending Illegal Discrimination and Restoring Merit-Based Opportunity](#)

- **Organizational Capacity and Record on Previous Grants** – 25 points:
  - The project proposal demonstrates that the organization has sufficient expertise, skills, and human resources to implement the project, including internal controls in place to manage federal funds. If sub-awards are proposed, applicant demonstrates experience managing subawards.
  - The organization demonstrates that it has a clear understanding of the underlying issue that the project will address.
  - The organization demonstrates capacity for successful planning and responsible fiscal management. This includes a financial management system, a bank account, and if applicable, satisfactory audit findings.
  - Applicants who have received grant funds previously have been compliant with applicable rules and regulations, including the Award Provisions and Standard Terms and Conditions.
  - Where partners are described, the applicant details each partner’s respective role and provides curriculum vitae (CVs) for persons responsible for the project and financial administration. Proposed personnel, institutional resources, and partners are adequate and appropriate.
  
- **Project Planning/Ability to Achieve Objectives** – 20 points: The project plan is well developed, with sufficient detail about how activities will be carried out. The proposal specifies target audiences, participant recruitment, and geographic areas of implementation. The proposal outlines clear, achievable objectives. The proposal includes a reasonable implementation timeline. The project scope is appropriate and clearly defined.
  
- **Budget** – 10 points: The budget and narrative justification are sufficiently detailed. The budget demonstrates that the organization has devoted time to accurately determine expenses associated with the project instead of providing rough estimates. Costs are reasonable in relation to the proposed activities and anticipated results. The results and proposed outcomes justify the total cost of the project. Budget items are reasonable, allowable, and allocable.
  
- **Monitoring and Evaluation** - 10 points: The project proposal includes an M&E plan. The applicant demonstrates it is able to measure program success against key indicators and provides milestones to indicate progress toward goals and objectives outlined in the proposal. The proposal includes output and outcome indicators and shows how and when those will be measured. Funded projects will have their plans finalized during the negotiation phase, and monitoring plans may be subject to periodic updates throughout the life of the project.
  
- **Sustainability** – 5 points: The project proposal describes clearly the approach that will be used to ensure maximum sustainability or advancement of project goals after the end of project activity.

## 2. *Indirect Costs*

If two or more applications receive equivalent scores based on the evaluation criteria outlined in this NOFO, preference will be given to the applicant with the lower indirect cost rate, as consistent with Executive Order 14332, Section 4(b)(iii). This preference will only be applied as a tie-breaking mechanism and does not supersede the primary evaluation criteria.

## 3. *Review and Selection Process*

- a. Acknowledgement of receipt. Applicants will receive acknowledgment of receipt of their proposal.
- b. Review. All submissions are screened for technical eligibility. **If a submission is missing any required forms/documents listed above in Section D. Application Contents and Format, it will be considered ineligible and will not be reviewed by the grants review committee.** A technical review panel will review eligible proposals based upon the criteria noted in this NOFO.
- c. Follow up notification. Applicants will generally be notified within 120 days after the NOFO deadline regarding the results of the review panel.

## 2. *Risk Review*

- i. Under the merit review as required by 2 CFR 200.206, prior to making a Federal Award the Department will review and consider the following risk factors:

If a proposal is selected for funding, the Department of State has no obligation to provide any additional future funding. Renewal of an award to increase funding or extend the period of performance is at the discretion of the Department of State.

Issuance of this NOFO does not constitute an award commitment on the part of the U.S. government, nor does it commit the U.S. government to pay for costs incurred in the preparation and submission of proposals. Further, the U.S. government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals received.

### **Payment Method:**

Recipients will be required to request payments by completing form SF-270—Request for Advance or Reimbursement and submitting the form to the Grants Officer and Grants Officer Representative.

Recipients may not draw down funds without the affirmative authorization of the Department of State. In addition, recipients must submit, with each SF-270 payment request, a detailed explanation justifying the request.
