Are there any entities that hold key water rights, or are large economic drivers in the area?</i>	<i>Example: Industrial stakeholders are regulated for water quality impacts, and many have water rights in the area.</i>	<i>Examples: private businesses</i>
<b>Municipal and Local Government</b>	<i>What are the government entities that have interactions with water resources or policy (providing water for drinking, cleaning, sanitation, fire protection, maintenance, municipal parks and recreation, etc.)?</i>	<i>Example: Municipal stakeholders divert, store, treat, and provide water to the public.</i>	<i>Examples: city and county agencies</i>

<b>Recreation</b>	<i>What role does recreation play in the watershed? Are there parks, industries, or sports that relate to water resources? Is tourism a driving factor?</i>	<i>Example: Recreational stakeholders depend on water for lake and river recreation and snow sports.</i>	<i>Examples: water-based recreation orgs, local businesses, private landowners, community members</i>
<b>Environment</b>	<i>Who are the main parties in charge of or interested in conserving natural resources in the area? How significant is their role?</i>	<i>Example: Environmental stakeholders are interested in instream flows, habitat, fish and wildlife, and ecosystem services.</i>	<i>Examples: nonprofits, community members</i>
<b>Federal and State Government</b>	<i>Who are the major Federal and state entities at play in the watershed? What groups are in charge of administering natural resource programs?</i>	<i>Example: Government agencies that manage and protect water and other natural resources.</i>	<i>Examples: state and Federal agencies</i>
