Is the above statement in Section F meant to convey this as well? As written, it could be interpreted to mean that these activities are excluded.</p>	<p>The Innovative Technology NOFO is meant to support the enhancement of front-end fuel cycle activities that include mining/milling, conversion, enrichment and/or deconversion activities.</p>

Section B. Limitation on Number of Applications Eligible for Review, page 10, states that “An entity</p>	<p>Yes, the prime applicant may submit one application for each topic area (A maximum of two applications). The prime applicant must ensure each application meets the full scope of work for each topic area</p>

		<p>may submit only <u>one application for each topic area</u> contained within this NOFO.” While Page 22 states “Applicants may pick which Topic Area for which they wish to submit an application. <u>Applications will be only accepted from each lead applicant for only one of the Topic Areas.</u>”</p> <p>Please clarify if a lead applicant can submit a proposal to <u>both</u> Topic Area 1 (Demonstration Projects) and Topic Area 2 (Research and Development Projects) for a combined maximum of two applications. We note that the HALEU Transportation Package FOA (DE-FOA-0002967) Questions and Answers does permit applications for both Topic Areas.</p>	within the Innovative Technology NOFO.

01/01/2025	01/06/2025	<p>Question #4</p> <p>The FOA mentions that DOE will be involved in the execution of these projects, but for this particular subject the involvement would have to be really extensive, including locating the project either at ORNL or at the Idaho site, and expecting DOE staff to actively assist with the regulatory aspects (a good analogy - Oppenheimer needed Groves to navigate the administrative environment).</p> <p>Would such a project be responsive? Or perhaps there is some more appropriate alternative to applying to DE-FOA-0003487, e.g. working with an established DOE contractor?</p>	<p>An application as described in the question, may be considered responsive. To be considered responsive, an applicant must submit its application no later than the required due date, March 12, 2025, and the applicant must complete all the required documents that are listed in NOFO part 1 and NOFO part 2. Several of the required documents and forms are included with the NOFO announcement in grants.gov.</p> <p>Although not required, an applicant may include one or more federally funded research and development center (FFRDC) as part of its application. Applicants are not required to include an FFRDC in their application.</p>

The information provided under <i>Application Content and Form</i> in Part 1 lists a Project Management Plan (5 pages). The pertinent Part 2 instructions suggest using a form available from Grants.Gov to satisfy this requirement. The same <i>Application Content and Form</i> instructions in Part 1 mandate the inclusion of a Project Management Plan in the Technical Volume. The relevant weighting of the evaluation criteria provided on Page 22 of Part 1 suggest this second Project Management Plan to be somewhat more detailed than that which could be communicated on the 5-page Grants.Gov form. It is unclear whether DOE is requesting one or two Project Management Plans. Please clarify this matter.</p>	<p>Each application should contain a single Project Management Plan (PMP). DOE recommends following the guidance outlined in Part 1 on pages 25-26, or use the PMP template that is provided in the “Attachments-HALU Innovative Technology NOFO” package found on grants.gov found under the DE-FOA-0003487 file. This will ensure the information provided in the application package meets the necessary technical requirements (refer to Section 4, Part 2. Technical Volume, starting on page 23).</p>

Then click the File Name “DE-FOA-0003487 (BASE).zip”. This zip file includes four volumes. One of these volumes is titled “Attachments-HALU Innovative Technology NOFO”. This volume includes 15 forms and documents required as part of the application submission. For all other required forms or documents not included in the “Attachments-HALU Innovative Technology NOFO” volume refer to the NOFO Part 2 document for instructions on where to locate each specific form or document. The NOFO Part 2 document also explains how to complete each application form or application document.</p>

Section 7(a) of this order directed a pause for the disbursement of funds appropriated through the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA) or the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). DOE has not received specific directions related to this NOFO. Until such direction is provided, DOE will continue through the NOFO process. No awards will be made until DOE has been given approval to disperse funds. If anything should change in the future regarding BIL/IRA funding, DOE will provide an update to this answer.</p>
01/27/2025	01/28/2025	<p>Question #23</p> <p>Section III, D. 6, requires the applicant to “Provide an early Go/No Go decision point to allow DOE to meet its potential obligations under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Work in this first phase may only include scope that would be allowable interim actions under NEPA (see 40 CFR 1502.2(f) and 10 CFR 1021.211). The applicant should also be prepared to provide technical information to DOE during this phase to support a NEPA decision.”</p>	<p>DOE does not yet know what NEPA documents will be necessary for the Innovative Technology NOFO. DOE will decide which NEPA documents are required based on the Offeror’s Environmental Report received as part of the application package. The HALEU EIS was specifically created for the procurement of HALEU and would not cover this specific action.</p>

		DOE issued a final HALEU Environmental Impact Statement for the Department's proposed action to acquire HALEU through procurement from commercial sources to facilitate the establishment of commercial HALEU fuel production. Does this review cover this NOFO? Will a separate programmatic NEPA be required, and if so, what is the expected timing for DOE to complete a separate NEPA determination?

We initially understood the NOFO to include all steps of the front-end fuel cycle development. However, Section F says, "applications that include significant effort to support the back end of the enriched uranium supply chain (i.e., not mining/milling, conversion, enrichment, and/or deconversion)" is not of interest. Would projects focused on TRISO pebble production then be disqualified?</p>	DOE has a vested interest in all aspects of the front-end cycle, including fuel fabrication, though DOE recognizes that fuel fabrication and Mining/Milling could be a lower priority. DOE is looking for applications that address technology gaps, enhance existing processes for producing HALEU, and promote the advancement of new technologies that could reduce risk, increase production, or reduce costs.

Due to the costs associated with equipment procurement, fabrication, and operation that must be performed by the FFRDC, the majority of costs in the proposal will be incurred by the FFRDC. However, it is the judgement of the applicant that the scope of the applicant will be more significant than that of the FFRDC.</p> <p>Therefore, clarification is requested regarding the statement in “Limit on FFRDC Effort” in NOFO Part 1 that “the FFRDC scope should not be more significant than the applicants’ scope.” Is this limit strictly based on assigned scope between applicant and FFRDC or does cost become a factor in that decision? If cost is part of this decision, cost share requirements could be satisfied through cash contributions by the applicant. If cost is the deciding factor, will DOE consider requests to waive this limit in light of the need to have the proposed HALEU work performed at a national laboratory that is licensed to handle such material and that has been involved in previous HALEU development work with the applicant?</p>	<p>associated cost are close to 50%, It is deemed a waiver. DOE would be open to reviewing a waiver for applicants, contingent on cost being close to 50%. DOE must review the details before making a decision on the waiver. The waiver to DOE should clearly articulate the role of FFRDC, as well as the scope and risk involved .</p>
