Funding Opportunity Description: The NOAA Office of Ocean Exploration and Research (OER), also known as NOAA Ocean Exploration, is soliciting proposals to conduct or support ocean exploration resulting in outcomes that provide or enable initial assessments about unknown or poorly understood regions of U.S. waters. This funding opportunity will focus on the outcomes of the Workshop to Identify National Ocean Exploration Priorities in the Pacific hosted by the Consortium for Ocean Leadership (COL) in 2020 in partnership with OER. Proposals should support the ocean exploration topical priorities or spatial priorities in the U.S. Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) identified in the “Report on the Workshop to Identify National Ocean Exploration Priorities in the Pacific” (https://oceanleadership.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/11/OceanExploration_PacificPriorities_WorkshopReport_NOV2020.pdf).

Proposals should also support the National Strategy for Mapping, Exploring, and Characterizing the United States Exclusive Economic Zone (national strategy, <https://oeab.noaa.gov/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/2020-national-strategy.pdf>). Proposals for the ocean exploration and marine archaeology themes must be for projects in unknown or poorly understood areas as referenced in the national strategy’s implementation plan (<https://oeab.noaa.gov/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/2021-national-strategy-implementation.pdf>) and within the U.S. EEZ in the Pacific Ocean.

The Pacific priorities workshop report stresses the active awareness of the cultural context in which ocean exploration is often conducted. Recognizing the unique and numerous Pacific communities as partners and stakeholders enhances the overall impact of the ocean exploration enterprise through wider public support, a more diverse workforce and community of practitioners, and incorporation of traditional knowledge systems throughout the process. Applicants should consider including the interests of tribal nations and Indigenous peoples within targeted exploration areas and engaging these communities in a meaningful way.

OER is soliciting proposals focused on any one of the following three themes:

1. **OCEAN EXPLORATION:** Exploration of the biological, chemical, and physical ocean environments and areas to inform future characterization, research, and responsible ocean stewardship in unknown or poorly explored U.S. deepwater areas (see the definition of ocean exploration in the national strategy). Areas proposed for exploration must be at water depths of 200 m or more. OER is particularly interested in themes and/or geographic priorities identified by the COL Pacific workshop report, including proposals on deep-ocean acoustics, the water column, seafloor habitat, biology, and marine resources. The use of autonomous and other innovative technologies is an OER priority.
2. **MARINE ARCHAEOLOGY.** Exploration and discovery of underwater cultural heritage sites and objects to enrich U.S. maritime history and inform decisions concerning site, feature, or object preservation and potential seafloor use. Marine archaeology projects can be conducted in any water depth. OER is particularly interested in proposals focused on themes and/or geographic priorities identified by the COL Pacific workshop report, including submerged evidence of early human migration and occupation on the continental shelf and places significant to U.S. history. The use of autonomous and other innovative technologies is an OER priority.
3. **TECHNOLOGY.** Application of new or novel use of existing ocean technologies or innovative methods that could increase the scope and efficiency of acquiring ocean exploration data and expanding exploration data availability and use. Proposed ocean technologies must be applicable to water depths of 200 m or greater, preferably full-ocean depth (testing in shallower water or lab-based testing is acceptable). OER is particularly interested in proposals focused on innovative sensors and technologies that could increase the capabilities of autonomous seagoing systems and artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning (ML) applications that could improve ocean exploration data usability and accessibility. For the purpose of this opportunity, costs for ship time and/or other ocean data collection platform support (remotely operated vehicles, autonomous underwater vehicles, etc.) are considered rental costs and therefore are not included in Modified Total Direct Cost (MTDC). The exception is for institutions with a federal negotiated Indirect Cost (IDC) Rate agreement that covers these charges.

Note: Ship time on NOAA Ship Okeanos Explorer will not be funded through this announcement.

I. Funding Opportunity Description

A. Program Objective

The world's deep ocean remains largely unexplored, leaving significant gaps in the basic environmental intelligence needed to manage and protect ocean resources, forecast future environmental changes, and facilitate sustainable economic development of the ocean. By leading national efforts to explore our ocean and making ocean exploration more accessible, the NOAA Office of Ocean Exploration and Research (OER) is filling gaps in the basic understanding of U.S. deep waters and seafloor, providing critical deep-ocean data, information, and awareness needed to sustain and accelerate the economy, health, and security of our nation.

Through the FY 2022 Notice of Funding Opportunities, NOAA OER seeks to support:

1. Exploration of the biological, chemical, and physical ocean environments and areas to inform future characterization, research, and responsible ocean stewardship in unknown or poorly explored U.S. deepwater areas;
2. Exploration and discovery of underwater cultural heritage sites and objects; and
3. Application of new or novel use of existing ocean technologies or innovative methods.

Successful proposals are typically undertaken by a multi-partner group and are characterized by an interdisciplinary and innovative exploration approach; they frequently leverage other programs/organizations with compatible objectives; they employ advanced technology platforms and sensors to further explore and characterize priority themes; they produce information that will be valuable to state and federal marine resource managers; they give consideration to environmental impacts in the project planning and represent the applicant's ability to acquire all necessary permits; they explain the applicant's plan for making data and results publicly available to advance scientific knowledge and inform environmental management decisions; and they provide a plan for outreach/education and diversity and inclusion activities.

Investigators whose proposals are funded must adhere to an open data policy which ensures that all environmental data and information collected or created by the program, once quality controlled, are promptly made available to requestors; and comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and all other federal laws regarding environmental

protection (e.g., the Endangered Species Act, Marine Mammal Protection Act, and National Marine Sanctuaries Act).

In addition, successful applicants will be expected to foster partnerships to accomplish NOAA ocean exploration goals; and engage and educate audiences by sharing information about ocean exploration through innovative means.

C. Program Authority

33 USC 3403(a)

II. Award Information

A. Funding Availability

OER anticipates a total of approximately \$3,000,000 will be available through this announcement. Through this solicitation, OER anticipates being able to support approximately 4-10 awards with budgets ranging from \$75,000 to a maximum of \$750,000 total to be spent over one or two years. Any proposal below \$75,000 or that exceeds \$750,000 will not be considered for review and will be disqualified. The amount of funding available through this announcement will be subject to the final FY2022 appropriation/allocation for NOAA OER. Publication of this announcement does not obligate NOAA to fund any specific project or obligate all or any part of available funds. There is no guarantee that sufficient funds will be available to initiate or continue exploration activities where funding has been recommended by OER. The amount of funding that OER may recommend for a grant will be determined in pre-award negotiations between the applicant and OER. The OER Selecting Official may defer selected FY 2022 proposals for consideration for funding in the subsequent, or later, fiscal year(s).

B. Project/Award Period

OER will accept proposals for projects that are one or two years in duration. The anticipated award start date is on or near September 1, 2022.

C. Type of Funding Instrument

Proposals selected for funding will be funded through a grant or cooperative agreement under the terms of this notice. Proposals selected for funding from NOAA scientists will be funded through an intra-agency transfer. Proposals from a non-NOAA federal agency will be funded through an interagency agreement transfer.

For applications funded through cooperative agreements, substantial involvement of the federal government may include, but is not limited to, activities such as specifying direction or redirection of the scope of work due to interrelationships with other projects or stipulating that the recipient must meet or adhere to specific procedural requirements before subsequent stages of a project may continue.

By receiving funding from OER, all applicants agree to certain requirements for education

and outreach, data management, and website development. To help meet these requirements, one or more NOAA staff or NOAA designee(s) will be assigned as a primary point of contact to assist in planning and execution of these activities. In some cases, the POC(s) may become a member of an at-sea science team serving roles as Expedition Coordinators, Data Managers, or Web Coordinators. For more details please refer to section VIII of this document.

III. Eligibility Information

A. Eligible Applicants

Eligible applicants are U.S.-based institutions of higher education; non-profit institutions; state, local, and tribal governments; federal agencies; for-profit organizations; and U.S. territories. PLEASE NOTE: Before non-NOAA federal applicants may be funded, they must affirm that they have legal authority to receive funds from another federal agency in excess of their appropriation. Because this announcement is not proposing to procure goods or services from the applicants, the Economy Act (31 U.S.C. section 1535) is not an appropriate basis. NOAA and other federal agencies that possess the statutory authority to accept funding for this type of work must agree to take FY 2022 funding for proposed projects (both one and two year projects) and allocate them in FY 2022.

The DOC and NOAA support cultural and gender diversity and encourage women and minority individuals and groups to submit applications to this NOFO. In addition, DOC/NOAA is strongly committed to broadening the participation of historically black colleges and universities, Hispanic serving institutions, tribal colleges and universities, and institutions that work in underserved areas. DOC/NOAA encourages applications involving any of the above institutions.

B. Cost Sharing or Matching Requirement

Cost-sharing, matching funds, in-kind contributions or contribution of no-cost ship time, etc. are not required.

C. Other Criteria that Affect Eligibility

1. Potential Partners

OER encourages partnerships between academia, government agencies, foundations, and private-sector companies. Foreign entities can participate only through collaboration with an eligible U.S.-based entity through a subaward. OER also encourages investigators to enhance or expand the scope of their projects through complementary proposals to other sponsors, both internal and external to NOAA (e.g., for shiptime or other assets). The strength,

breadth, and depth of any partnership to accomplish the work proposed is evaluated as part of the overall qualifications of applicants evaluation criterion.

2. Permits and Approvals

It is the applicant's responsibility to obtain all necessary international, federal, state, and local government permits and approvals where necessary for the proposed work to be conducted. Applicants are expected to design their proposals so that they minimize potential adverse environmental impacts of the proposed work. If applicable, documentation of requests for or approvals of cultural resource or environmental permits must be included in the proposal package.

A National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) questionnaire (<https://www.nepa.noaa.gov/docs/NOAA-Grants-Questionnaire-final.pdf>) must be completed for each proposal to ensure there is sufficient information about the project to allow OER to analyze the project's potential environmental impacts, pursuant to NEPA (See Section VI.B for more details).

Prior to submitting a full proposal, applicants who propose archaeological work in state waters must consult with the appropriate State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). For such proposals, it must be indicated whether SHPO staff provided an opinion of the project's potential to affect historic resources. Applicants must adhere to any regulations or guidelines that may apply and obtain the appropriate permits to conduct the proposed work. Sample collection must adhere to Federal and State law, and the applicant must make accommodations for conservation and curating as described in the Annex Rules of the UNESCO Convention for the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage.

B. Content and Form of Application

See Sections IV.D for submission due dates, IV.G for submission procedures, IV.A for

addresses, and V.A for pre-proposal evaluation criteria.

1. Format requirements (applies to both pre- and full proposals):
 - a. Submissions should be formatted to print on 8.5" x 11" paper with 1-inch margins in 12-point font.
 - b. The Principal Investigator's last name should be typed in the bottom right-hand corner of each page. All digital files should be named with the applicant's last name and a descriptor indicating the file content, e.g. "Jones Cover Sheet 2022".
 - c. Title must be no longer than 15 words/100 characters.

2. Pre-proposal Required Content

A pre-proposal is a prerequisite to submitting a full proposal. A pre-proposal should identify the project's priorities and objectives and describe how these relate to NOAA's mission goals and OER's mission, objectives, and priorities (as described in Sections I.A and I.B above).

Complete, two-page pre-proposals are required for all applications. No more than two pages will be evaluated. Incomplete pre-proposals will not be considered. All information must be included in the designated two pages and the OER NOFO Cover Sheet. Required information must include: vessels, platforms, or other critical assets required to technically achieve the goals and their costs; auxiliary funding sources for the proposed project; dates of anticipated field operations and any operational constraints, especially with regard to field operations; and anticipated outputs (e.g., potential discoveries, knowledge and impact, published papers, reports, meetings, and/or education and outreach material).

Cover Sheet Requirements

All pre-proposal submissions must include a completed OER NOFO Cover Sheet which is available at: <https://oceanexplorer.noaa.gov/about/funding-opps/media/fy22-ffo-coversheet.pdf>. All applicable sections must be completed in full, including project title; priority themes addressed; PI and collaborator contact information; outside support; field operations, vessel, and ancillary platform information; budget estimate; and education and outreach. Pre-proposal Narrative Requirements (see Sections IV.B.1 for formatting requirements and V.A.1 for evaluation criteria):

- a. A pre-proposal narrative must not exceed two pages, including any figures, the anticipated funding request, references, and any other content.
- b. Describe how the proposal is relevant to NOAA and OER missions and goals. You must include the project's intrinsic value, how it is exploratory rather than research based, and its expected scientific impact.
- c. Describe the scientific and technical merit of the proposal. Discuss project goals and objectives, how the project is innovative and interdisciplinary, its exploration value and potential impact, and its logistical feasibility.
- d. Provide the qualifications and competencies of the applicant(s).
- e. If a ship (or other seagoing asset) is required, the applicant(s) must state that they have assured that the ship (or other asset) is available when needed and have the administrative means to arrange and pay for it.

Pre-proposals must be submitted by email to oer.ffo2022@noaa.gov (see IV.A for guidance for mail submission). Pre-proposals received after the deadline, 11:59 pm on June 21, 2021, will not be evaluated.

3. Full Proposal Required Content

Full proposals should demonstrate relevance to NOAA's and OER's mission goals and priorities (as described in Sections I.A and I.B). Applicants should use September 1, 2022 when referring to the project award date in the proposal and on the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Standard Forms.

No appendices are permitted.

Full proposals must include the content described below in the order listed, unless otherwise indicated. For those using Grants.gov to submit their material, each document listed below must be uploaded as a separate file. All full proposals must include:

- a. Completed OER NOFO Cover Sheet (Available at: <https://oceanexplorer.noaa.gov/about/funding-opps/media/fy22-ffo-coversheet.pdf>). This is the same form that is to be submitted with the pre-proposal, but must be updated for submission with the full proposal.

b. Maximum one-page Executive Summary describing the essential elements of the project being proposed. The summary must include: 1) Title (= 15 words/100 characters), 2) List of names, contact details, and affiliations of each investigator who will significantly contribute to the project, 3) A concise statement of the compelling objectives and benefits of the project and the rationale for the work proposed, and 4) Funding request for each year of the project and the total funding requested. The statement should be written in language that can convey to non-experts the key elements of the project and the project's importance in regard to advancing ocean exploration goals.

c. A Project Narrative not to exceed 15 pages, including all text (minimum 12-point font) and any tables and visual materials (e.g., charts, graphs, maps, photographs). Any project narrative pages beyond the 15-page limit will be removed from the proposal before it is reviewed. The 15-page limit does not include: the Executive Summary, Budget Justification and Tables, Data and Information Sharing Plan (see VIII.C), Outreach and Education Plan, Diversity, Inclusion, and Broader Impacts Statement, Literature Cited, Current and Pending Support, Curriculum Vitae, Letters of Commitment, and Required Forms (e.g., NEPA).

Project Narrative Requirements:

- i. Project's scientific, technical, historical, cultural, or socioeconomic importance and merit.
- ii. Project's goals and objectives and the proposed methodology.
- iii. Anticipated contributions of participating personnel.
- iv. Description of any complementary funding.
- v. Dates of field operations and any operational constraints.
- vi. If a ship (or other seagoing asset) is required, the applicant must state that they have assured that the ship (or other asset) is available when needed and that the host institution would, if provided with the funding, have the administrative means to arrange and pay for it.
- vii. Anticipated outputs from the proposed project (e.g., potential discoveries, knowledge and impact, published papers, reports, meetings, and/or education and outreach material).
- viii. The value to NOAA and the Nation and how the project's anticipated outcomes will benefit our understanding of the ocean, the science community, and society.
- ix. Applicants for marine archaeology proposals must consult with the appropriate State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and indicate whether SHPO staff provided an opinion of your project's potential to affect historic resources under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

d. Data and Information Sharing Plan: Proposals submitted in response to this announcement must include a Data Management Plan (up to 2 pages). See Section VI.B, Administrative and National Policy Requirements, for additional information.

e. Outreach and Education Plan: In one page or less, describe how the proposed work will be used to support education and outreach efforts. Also state a willingness to participate in OER's education and outreach programming.

f. Statement of Diversity and Inclusion: OER recognizes that it has a particular and unique opportunity to support NOAA's commitment to diversity and inclusion by taking an intentional step that encourages program applicants to consider diversity and inclusion as part of their scientific projects. This action has the potential to make an impact on not only the diversity and inclusion in science at NOAA, but also beyond the agency. In one page or less, describe how well the proposed activity broadens the participation of underrepresented groups (e.g., gender, ethnicity, disability, geographic, etc.). Examples could include, but are not limited to, full participation of women, persons with disabilities, and underrepresented minorities in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Diversity is defined as a collection of individual attributes that together help organizations achieve objectives. Inclusion is defined as a culture that connects each employee to the organization. Promoting diversity and inclusion improves creativity, productivity, and the vitality of the ocean exploration community in which OER engages. NOAA OER values the advancement of scientific knowledge and activities that contribute to the achievement of societally relevant outcomes. Such outcomes include, but are not limited to: full participation of women, persons with disabilities, and underrepresented minorities in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); increased public scientific literacy and public engagement with science and technology; improved well-being of individuals in society; development of a diverse, globally competitive STEM workforce; increased partnerships between academia, industry, and others; improved national security; increased economic competitiveness of the United States; and enhanced infrastructure for research and education.

g. Previous Significant Results: A concise summary of previous significant results and achievements from any prior, or ongoing, NOAA Office of Ocean Exploration and Research funding. This summary should include publications and outputs, and data and information sharing experience.

h. Summary of Current Funding Support: Applicants must provide information on all their current and pending federal support for ongoing projects and proposals, including potential subsequent funding in the case of continuing grants. The proposed project and all other projects or activities using federal assistance or that requires a portion of time of the Principal Investigator or other senior personnel should be included. The relationship between the proposed project and these other projects should be described, and the number of person-months per year to be devoted to the projects must be clearly stated.

i. Resumes: A maximum of two pages for each Principal and Co-Principal Investigator(s), including a list of relevant recent publications.

j. Budget Justification and Budget Table: These must adhere to the guidance and templates provided in the NOAA Grants Management Division's Budget Narrative Guidance which can be found at:

https://www.noaa.gov/sites/default/files/atoms/files/gmd_budget_narrative_guidance_-_05-24-2017_final.pdf. All expenses are to be displayed with each year reflected in individual sections. All expenses are to be rounded to the nearest dollar.

The budget must include, and justify, sufficient resources to analyze, interpret, publish, and archive data (in accordance with the Data and Information Sharing Plan) and results of the project. Applicants must describe the scope of work and budget for each year of support being sought (not to exceed two years), and a summary budget table for the entire award period.

The summary budget table must reflect the object classes contained in the SF-424A form, which is the Grants.gov official budget form, included with the submission. The table must reflect the computations and basis used in the development of costs and justifications for: salary and travel (travel must be itemized to include destination, airfare, per diem, lodging, and ground travel); contracts for analyses or cataloging; publications; rentals; supplies; equipment; sub-awards to other parties for services; and non-standard items, including ship time and submersible assets being requested from OER for support. V. Application Review Information

A. Evaluation Criteria

Pre- and full proposals will be evaluated as follows:

1. Pre-Proposal Evaluation Criteria

Pre-proposals will be evaluated by the OER program using the following criteria to either encourage or discourage submission of full proposals:

- a. Relevance to NOAA and OER missions and goals;
- b. Scientific and technical merit;
- c. Qualifications and competencies of the applicants, including past performance on prior OER awards; and
- d. Costs for specific items as well as the overall project cost including value of cost-

sharing and/or in-kind contributions.

Given a discourage assessment, the decision of whether or not to submit a full proposal is left to the applicant(s).

2. Full Proposal Evaluation Criteria

Full proposals will be evaluated and rated individually by no fewer than three independent peer mail reviewers and a peer-review panel with collective expertise in the relevant disciplines. All peer reviewers are required to sign confidentiality and non-disclosure agreements. The review will consist of a determination and analysis of strengths, weaknesses, deficiencies, and risks associated with each proposal.

The following are the criteria and corresponding weight values to be used to evaluate the full proposals:

- a. Importance/relevance and applicability of proposal to NOAA's and OER's missions and goals (30%): This criterion ascertains whether there is intrinsic value in the proposed work and/or relevance to NOAA, federal, regional, state, or local activities. For the OER program, this includes: 1) Is the proposed project germane to NOAA's mission goals, 2) Is the proposal exploration focused (expanding the breadth of knowledge) versus being research focused (expanding the depth of knowledge on any particular topic), and 3) Could the anticipated results have high downstream impact;
- b. Scientific and technical merit (30%): This criterion assesses whether the approach is technically sound and/or innovative, if the methods are appropriate, and whether there are clear project goals and objectives. For the OER program, this includes: 1) Is the proposed approach scientifically and technically feasible, 2) Is the proposal innovative, 3) Are there clear project goals and objectives, 4) Is the project interdisciplinary, 5) Are the methods commensurate with the goals and objectives, and 6) Are the plans for documentation, archival, and sharing of data, multimedia and specimen collections adequately outlined;
- c. Overall qualifications of applicants (15%): This criterion asks the reviewers to ascertain whether the applicant(s) possesses the necessary education, experience, training, facilities, and administrative resources to accomplish the project. For the OER review process, this includes evaluating: 1) The qualifications of the applicant(s) and 2) The strength, breadth, and depth of any partnership to accomplish the work proposed. If the applicant has previously received OER funding, this criterion also asks the reviewers to assess the applicant's prior OER award performance (e.g., timely publication of results and sharing of data);

- d. Project costs (15%): This criterion asks the reviewers to evaluate the proposal budget to determine if it is realistic and commensurate with the proposed project needs and timeframe;
- e. Outreach and Education and Diversity and Inclusion (10%): This criterion assesses whether the project provides a focused and effective education and outreach strategy regarding NOAA's mission to protect the Nation's natural resources and provides opportunity to broaden the participation of underrepresented groups (e.g., gender, ethnicity, disability, geographic, etc.). For the OER program, this includes the evaluation of the proposal budget to determine if the proposal includes an outreach and education plan that will target diverse future generations of explorers.

B. Review and Selection Process

Once a full proposal has been received by NOAA, an initial administrative review will be conducted to determine compliance with requirements and completeness of the application. When a proposal is determined to be in compliance and complete, the proposal will be subjected to peer review.

Peer reviewers will rate the individual proposals using the evaluation criteria and percentage weights provided above and will provide summary comments. Both federal and non-federal experts in the field may be used in the peer-review process, including both external mail reviews and/or a peer-review panel. Peer-review panelists will not be asked to reach consensus on individual proposals nor to rank the proposals.

The OER Selecting Official, in consultation with OER scientific and technical staff, will make the final decision based on external mail reviewer scores, summary comments, and summaries and scores from review panelists. Mail reviews are provided to panel reviewers, and mail review and panel review scores are both factored into the final ranking.

C. Selection Factors

In making final selections, the OER Selecting Official will award in rank order unless the proposal is justified to be selected/deselected out of rank order based upon one or more of the following factors:

1. Availability of funding;
2. Balance/distribution of funds;
 - a. Geographically

- b. By type of institutions
- c. By type of partners
- d. By research priorities
- e. By project types

3. Duplication of other projects funded or considered for funding by NOAA/federal agencies;

4. Program priorities and policy factors described in Section I.A and B, including, but not limited to, logistical feasibility and scientific discipline areas;

5. Applicant's prior award performance, including data and information sharing;

6. Partnerships and/or participation of diverse groups;

7. Adequacy of information necessary for NOAA staff to make a NEPA determination and draft necessary documentation to advance funding recommendations to the Grants Officer.

D. Anticipated Announcement and Award Dates

OER's intent is to notify all applicants of the results of the peer review of their proposal, as well as OER's final recommendation to award or decline funding, by email, approximately 180 days after receipt of the full proposal. Progress of the peer-review process as well as timing of budget allocation to OER may affect this timeline. Applicants should factor in this time when proposing starting dates for exploration activities. Project/award start dates are expected to be on or around September 1, 2022.

VI. Award Administration Information

A. Award Notices

1. Notification of Acceptance

Successful non-federal applicants will receive notification that their proposals have been funded from the NOAA Grants Management Division. Successful federal applicants will be notified by the OER Selecting Official. Unsuccessful applicants will be notified by the OER Selecting Official that their application was not selected for funding recommendation.

For non-federal applicants, project activities should not be initiated in the expectation of grant funding until a notice of award document is received from the NOAA Grants Management Division. Any spending prior to an official notice of award will be at the recipient's risk.

2. Modification to Applications

Successful applicants may be asked to modify objectives, work plans, or budgets prior to final approval of an award. The exact amount of funds to be awarded, the final scope of activities, the project duration, and specific NOAA substantial involvement in the activities of each grant will be determined in pre-award negotiations between the applicant and OER.

5. Unpaid or Delinquent Tax Liability

in time to meet ship/platform requirements, but no later than 30 days prior to the beginning of the expedition/field work. This requirement will be waived for projects with no field component.

2. Within 90 days of the completion of an expedition/fieldwork, recipients must provide a Cruise Report. This requirement will be waived for projects with no field component.

Guides will be provided by OER that must be used along with suggested items to be addressed. These two documents will be made publicly available along with the cruise datasets no later than two years following completion of the expedition.

3. Progress reports are due semi-annually and cover 6-month periods that begin with the start date of the project. Progress reports are submitted electronically to OER through Grants Online no later than 30 days after each 6-month project period. A final report is due no later than 90 days after the expiration date of an award. Progress reports should detail grant related activities that have occurred during the reporting period that correspond with the goals and objectives identified in the narrative, as well as provide specific, project related information, including a summary budget table of expenses for that period.

4. Within 60 days of completion of the expedition/fieldwork (or annually if the work is multi-year) grant recipients must provide:

a. An updated collection level metadata record identifying completed collections and including Digital Object Identifiers (if assigned);

b. A data inventory identifying data types collected, data release dates, and/or documents with specific proposed exceptions to the open data access policy (e.g., data that may have homeland/national security, cultural heritage, or protected resources value in accordance with NAO 212-151;

c. Expedition/fieldwork location data (e.g., ship navigation track or area of operations for public GIS display).

For continuing observations, data inventories should be submitted periodically if there is a significant change in location, type, or frequency of such observations.

VIII. Other Information

By receiving funding from OER, all applicants agree to expectations for sample collection, education and outreach, data management, and website requirements described below. To help meet these requirements, one or more NOAA staff or NOAA designee(s) may become members of, and assist, the at-sea science party serving roles as Expedition Coordinators, Data Managers, and/or Web Coordinators.

A. Sample Collection

Cultural heritage materials will only be collected after consultation with the appropriate State Historic Preservation Office and adhering to Section 106 of the Historic Preservation Act and other relevant regulations that may apply. The applicant must have the appropriate permits and must make accommodation for conservation and curating as described in the Annex Rules of the UNESCO Convention for the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage.

B. Education and Outreach

1. The lead Principal Investigator(s) for funded projects is required to provide an explanation on how they are following their proposed outreach and education plan.
2. All funded applicants and collaborators are strongly encouraged to cooperate with OER in facilitating education and outreach activities associated with their projects. NOAA OER's website (<https://oceanexplorer.noaa.gov/>) is the principal vehicle for chronicling and documenting all missions supported by OER. OER will assess and provide support for education and/or outreach activities in collaboration with the applicant, as warranted. Web content may include accompanying education materials. OER Education team members will facilitate development of materials and activities. Principal Investigators may be asked to contribute to NOAA's education and outreach activities, such as through development of lesson plans, accommodation of a teacher/educator-at-sea, participation in a media event or press conference to describe the expedition and its findings, or at-sea media participation.

3. The lead Principal Investigator(s) for funded projects is required to provide a summary article for the website following completion of the fieldwork or project. A project may be selected by OER to be fully documented on the OER website during the expedition. An OER Web Coordinator will work with the applicant and science party to determine the content of web offerings, and to develop and implement a web production plan for these select projects. A berth on the host research vessel should be dedicated for the Web Coordinator if feasible. The Web Coordinator is typically an OER federal employee or affiliate, and costs of their participation will be covered by NOAA OER.

C. Data and Information Sharing Requirements

OER is subject to NOAA Public Access to Research Results (PARR) (<https://repository.library.noaa.gov/view/noaa/10169>) policy and the implementing guidance contained in NOAA Environmental Data Management Committee (EDMC) Procedural Directives (<https://nosc.noaa.gov/EDMC/PD.all.php>). The PARR policy is NOAA's response to the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) memorandum, dated February 22, 2013, Increasing Access to the Results of Federally Funded Scientific Research (<https://repository.library.noaa.gov/view/noaa/13809>).

The Data and Publication Sharing Directive for NOAA Grants, Cooperative Agreements, and Contracts (https://nosc.noaa.gov/EDMC/documents/Data_Sharing_Directive_v3.0.pdf) is the procedural directive specific to competitive awards. This procedural directive requires OER to consider, in advance, how to ensure public accessibility and long-term preservation of NOAA-funded data, to provide guidance for applicants to use in developing a plan for data access, and to track and enforce conditions imposed on grant recipients.
